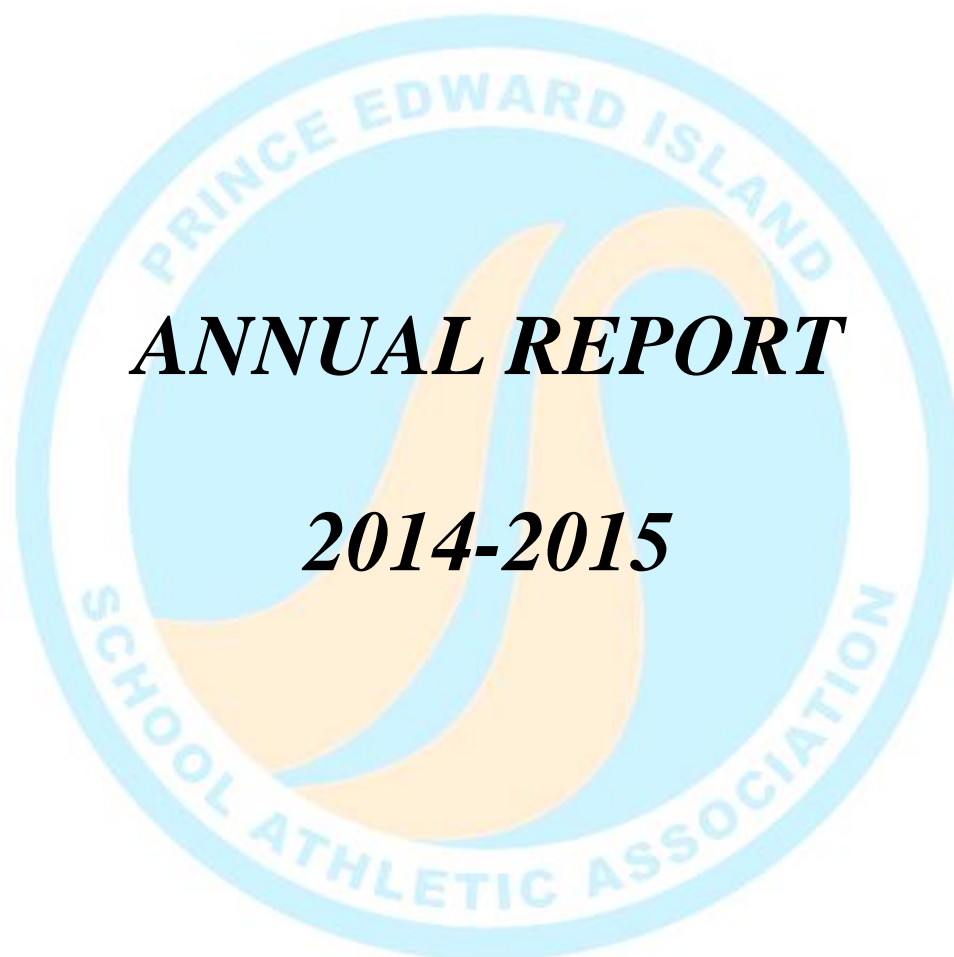

Officials' Commissioner Report 2014-2015

The PEISAA member schools, along with the executive, and the provincial sport organization Officials' Associations, continue to have a healthy working relationship. As an Association, we continue to be supportive in helping to build the various Officials' Associations to improve the level of officiating and the number of officials taking part in school sport.

This year, like most others, officiating challenges continue to be an area of concern for the PEISAA. These range from ensuring that there is a healthy number of officials to cover all games, officials leaving their sport for various reasons, ensuring that new officials are coming in or being recruited, retaining the officials that we have, mentoring officials to improve competencies, negative behaviors toward officials by players, coaches and/or spectators, etc

The following depicts the results from the member official associations of team sport oriented officials regarding the growth of their membership in the past year. The following questions were asked:

- 1. How many officials in your association are officiating PEISAA sport?*
- 2. Did your association hold any official's clinics this year?*
- 3. How many new officials did you have this year?*
- 4. Did you have any officials leave your sport this year? If you have the reason could you provide it as well; however, it is not necessary.*

Volleyball- Joe Ryan

1. There were thirty (30) referees officiating PEISAA sport
2. There was one (1) official's clinic in Sept., 2014 prior to PEISAA season, none in 2015
3. Four (4) new officials were recruited to referee volleyball.
4. Nobody left officiating ranks in volleyball this past year.

Soccer – Cory Deagle

1. There are approximately 30 officials in total who officiate PEISAA across the Province (East and West). For comparison there were approximately 90 officials registered in total for the 2014 season.
2. Each year soccer hosts both refresher (for returning) and entry level clinics. Seven (7) refreshers and two (2) entry level clinics were put on.
3. In addition, in an attempt to increase the number of female officials the PEISRA held an all-female entry level clinic on the last weekend of March. There were nine (9) participants in total, a great success.
4. A Regional clinic was also offered to those who have the ability and potential to move up to the next level.
5. This current year the PEISRA has 28 new officials who have taken the entry level clinic. Of course every year there is a turnover of officials for numerous reasons. Some of these may include verbal abuse, loss of interest, moving away, work schedule, etc. The largest

loss would be of younger referees **who feel they may not be up to it with some of the abuse they take.**

Basketball- Rob Anderson

1. this past season we had 38 members, all of which officiated PEISAA games at different levels
2. Clinics- 3 clinics were held, 1 Level 2 clinic for returning officials, and 2 Level 1 clinics for beginning or first year officials.
3. We had 9 individuals start out as new officials and came to clinics, but with studies, and work and lack of interest once they see the work involved, we ended up with 6- 5 in Charlottetown area and 1 new official in the Summerside area.
4. The turnover in Charlottetown and East has been an issue for several years– not sure why- lack of interest, do not like environment, and not getting enough work. We have had over the years some great potential in officials, but because they were not getting games to officiate, they have walked away
5. The Summerside area has had a good core for a few years now, and the new one helped this year
6. Attracting females to officiate is still an ongoing challenge

Rugby- Tim Hockin

1. Rugby had eleven (11) referees this year officiate at least one PEISAA game.
2. There had one refresher clinic in mid-April.
3. There were no new officials to rugby this year because the clinician's certification had expired.
4. There were four (4) officials leave. One for travel, one for family reasons, and two for work. There was a fifth official who retired, but managed to drag him out for a couple of games.

Our appreciation is also noted to all the member schools and individuals who took on the responsibility, in the rain, of running events at the Provincial Track & Field Championships. The volume of officials and volunteers needed to host this event is considerable and once again, many answered the call.

From the PEISAA, our sincerest thanks goes out to all officials throughout the province as they provide an invaluable service and should be commended for their dedication and valued contribution to School Athletics.

Congratulations to the 2015 PEISAA official of the year.

Subway Tournament Fund Committee Report 2014-2015

Over recent years, Subway has been providing financial support to PEI High Schools to help cover tournament costs. In return, during the tournaments, high schools have been promoting Subway in various ways. For example, the Subway name has been included in the tournament name (ex – ‘Subway Basketball Classic’), Subway signage, Subway T-shirts, Subway player of the game, and etc.

During the 2012 – 2013 school year, Subway PEI informed the P.E.I.S.A.A that they no longer wanted to manage the distribution of funds to the high schools. The P.E.I.S.A.A was granted permission to allocate the funds each year based on the criteria that was developed and outlined in the Subway Tournament Fund Tournament Application. We were pleased that \$10,000 was set aside for the 2012-2013 school year and another \$10,000 for the 2013-2014 school year. For the 2014 – 2015 school year, the P.E.I.S.A.A is in the processing of securing another \$10,000 to help offset high school tournament costs.

Due to the delay of the application process during the 2012-2013 and the 2013-2014 school years, schools were provided the opportunity to still apply and receive funding if they met the criteria set forth in the application. To date, the P.E.I.S.A.A is current with all the procedures and policies that are outlined in the Subway Tournament Fund criteria.

I strongly suggest that all high schools take the time to submit an application to the P.E.I.S.A.A. Thank-you to all schools who have applied and for hosting school tournaments. As we all know, there is a strong correlation between students who participate in school sports and student success.

FALL SPORT REPORTS

PEISAA Senior Soccer Final Report 2014-2015

1. SPORT PARTICIPATION NUMBERS

Male 13 teams and approximately 230 players *Female* 13 teams and approximately 230 players

2. GENERAL COMMENTS

The 2014 Fall Soccer Season had a very entertaining finish to it as all Gold Medal games came down to the last minute. The season went very well. The final standings in both A leagues were quite competitive as there were three points separating the top three teams. In the AAA Men's league, Rural and Gray were tied at the end of the regular season. The AAA Women's League was equally close, with most games being decided by 1 or 2 goals – there were actually 9 out of the 40 games ending in a tie. On the Championship Saturday, November 1st, we experienced some great soccer matches under some deteriorating weather over the course of the day. We were treated to four very entertaining Championship games. Souris reclaimed "A" Men's Gold defeating Kensington 3-2, on a goal scored in the last minute of play. In the "A" Women's Gold Medal game, Col. Gray defeated Rural 1-0, again, a goal scored in the last minute decided the game. The "AAA" Women's game had #1 seeded Gray defeat the #2 seeded Rural women 1-0 in a close game that had both teams getting several chances. The "AAA" Men's game was a very tightly contested game as well. The #2 seeded Rural upset #1 Col. Gray 2-1. Once again, a goal (Rural) in the last minute of play sent the game to overtime, which decided nothing. Rural defeated Gray 4-3 in penalty kicks to take home the Gold. All of the Medal Games at UPEI were well attended, given the wet, windy, and cold day. There were estimated 300-400 spectators watching the gold medal games.

Many thanks go out to the referee assigners, Cory Deagle in the East and Richard Pettipas in the West. They did a terrific job making sure games were covered. Hats off to our officials for getting to the fields in "light hours," we realize how difficult it is to get to the field at our kick-off times. Other thanks go out to Subway, UPEI, the Town of Cornwall, Comfort Inns, The Department of Education and Early Childhood, Craig Watson (PEISAA Sport Coordinator), Milk Sport and the Dairy Farmers of Canada, and the many coaches and players who provided many hours of entertaining soccer this fall. I would also like to thank Lincoln Rix and Kellie Steele for presenting medals at the bronze medal games at Cornwall.

Getting results was better this year, but there certainly could be an improved effort. Some coaches took advantage of texting me their scores, which allowed me to do the stats up each evening as they came in. Again, these coaches were also the ones who were good to add scores to the web site! Athletic Directors need to be checking in with these on a more regular basis. Unfortunately, I did have to send emails in the mornings after games to collect results from some schools. This usually resulted in getting the results I was missing fairly quickly.

3. RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Travel is an issue every year, and with budgets being cut, maybe we could have a few weekend tournaments throughout the season in addition to some regularly scheduled games, to take place of the long drives. For example, teams from the extremities could arrange to play in a central location against each other for two games, saving some travel. This would make for ease of officials as well. Teams could and should be utilizing the Cornwall turf fields for the same reasons. Double headers could be played during the week with two teams of officials covering the games.

2. More consistent reporting of games, better this year than last, but still room for improvement.

3. This was added last year, but not addressed:

In speaking to the referee association, there are some concerns with a couple fields that have benches on each side of the field. This is not a good situation as one team tends to be sitting with a group of parents and/or students on a set of bleachers. It has been asked of me to recommend each school provide two benches on one side (opposite side from fans) so the teams can occupy one side and the fans the other. This is a FIFA standard and we should follow suit.

4. During the play-offs, we need to have the fields at Cornwall, and possibly UPEI booked for the play-off games leading up to the championship weekend. We had many conflicts (especially with field hockey). Also, on Monday of that week this year we had 3 games in the Charlottetown area, and Wednesday, we had 5, so the use of the turf fields would allow games to start at a reasonable time and allow us to have 3 officials at each game.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

This year the league was divided up into two leagues (AA and A) with the AA teams playing an interlocking schedule. By having a tournament at the beginning of the season where all teams in the East played all teams in the West gave teams an opportunity to play each other. Teams declared at the beginning of the year what division they would play and stayed there for the year. This allowed teams to play other teams at their level of competition. There are always a couple of schools who could go either A or AA.

This year the number of soccer referees were up prior to previous years but we need to continue to develop qualified referees that can help in officiating our fall season.

I would like to say thank you to all school administrators, coaches, players and officials. Thanks for getting scores on the website and promptly getting game sheets into me the next morning. Richard Pettipas again assigned officials for us and without his hard work and dedication we would have not finished the season. Also, thanks to Craig Watson and the SAA executive for their leadership.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS

A) Game Reporting

- 1) All schools should continue to follow the reporting guidelines set down by the SAA.
- 2) Each home team is responsible for putting the results online following the game.
- 3) All game sheets to be faxed to the commissioner the next school day.

B) Regular Season

- 1) Continue to have teams declare at the beginning of the season if they are going A/AA.
- 2) Have a balanced schedule with no more than 7 games in the league schedule so there is ample time for practicing and playoffs.
- 3) Continue to be creative in scheduling so schools can keep their transportation budgets as low as possible.

C) Playoffs

- 1) Make sure there is room in the schedule to play all playoff games with the possibility of another year of a shortage of officials.
- 2) Due to transportation budgets we need to be creative with our playoffs. If two west teams play each other in a medal game we should try to play it as close to the two schools as possible.

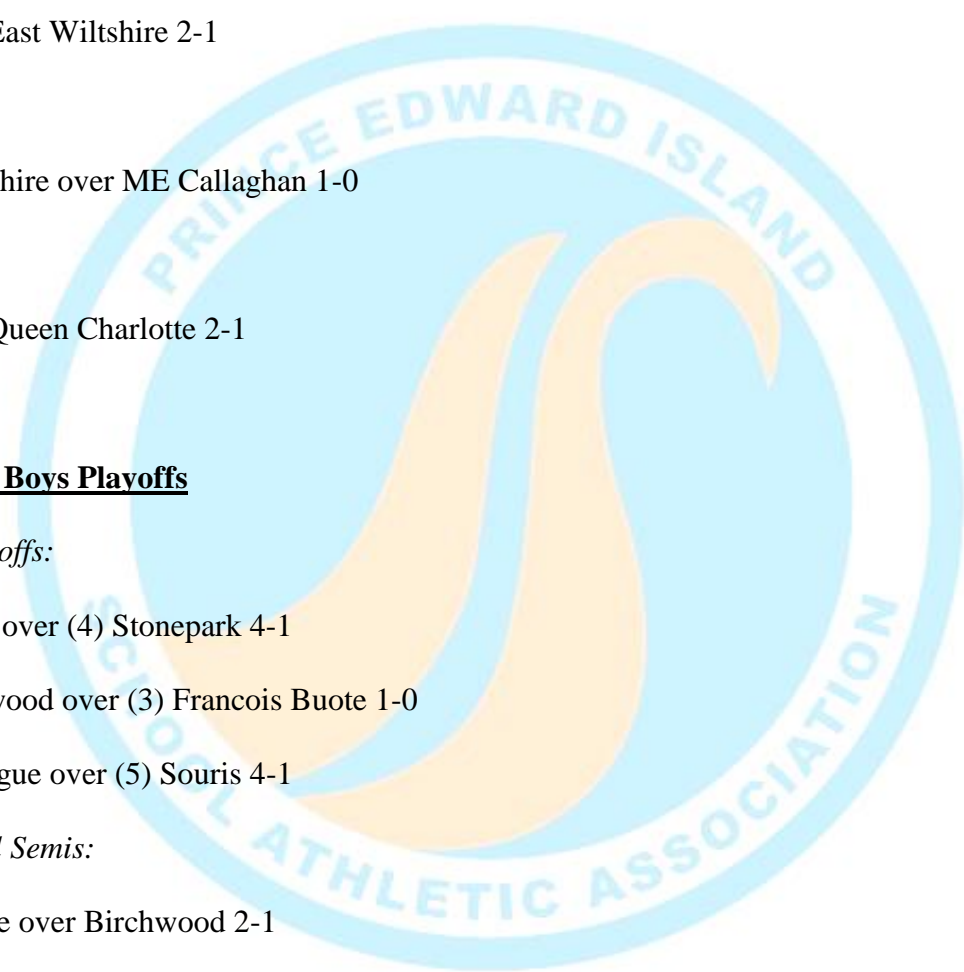

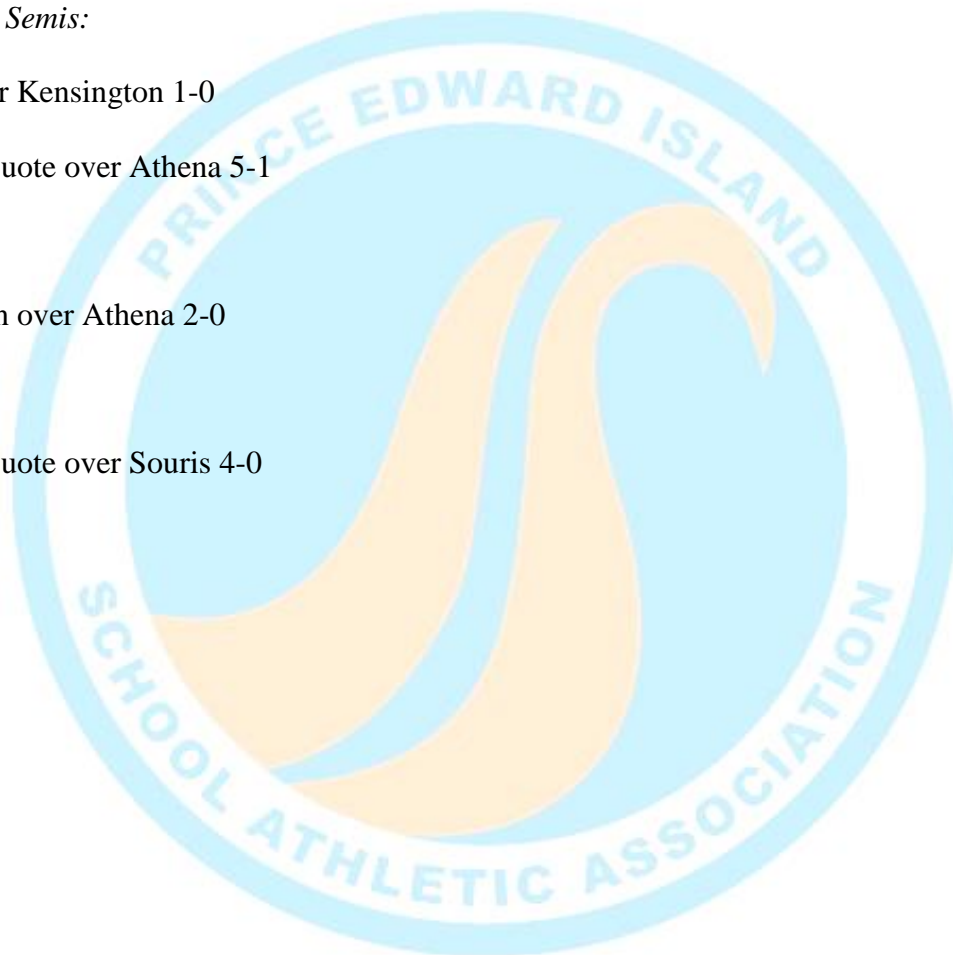

4. GENERAL COMMENTS: For the second year, the 2014 midget and high school field hockey had excellent weather for league play. No games were cancelled due to weather or lack of umpires. High school semi- finals, midget semi- finals and midget provincials were all successfully scheduled and played. However this was not the case for high school provincial championship as bronze and gold medal games were 48 hours from being cancelled for 2014! Thanks to UPEI for allowing me turf time to host on Thursday. Sheila Bell, Craig Watson for managing the senior tournament. Thank you to Richard Baker for umpiring the championship game (even though he was injured) and Ann Marie Ryan. Thanks to Ellen Andrews and Lacey MacLauchlan for umpiring the bronze game on short notice.

I will add how disappointed I was not to be able to attend high school provincials.

The new Shoot-out competition for overtime replaced the penalty stroke competition at both the junior & high school level for the 2013 season. I believe the shoot-out competition is a fairer method to determine an over- time winner to both the shooter and the goalie. January, 2014 Field Hockey Canada deleted the experimental rule “own goal without attacker touching the ball inside the attacking circle”. FHC added two new rules which we did not include for 2014 season.

Field hockey numbers are growing and there is still a need for more coaches. In 2014, SIS had two new young coaches, EWS had Jennifer and Alana Gillan return to coaching, Queen Charlotte had former UPEI player Lydia Ellis coach plus two UPEI players as assistant coaches. (Sydney Stavart and MacKenzie Deighan). Kayla Arsenault worked with TOSH and coach, Sue Thomson. So that is a step in the right direction.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS

A) The following 2013 recommendations were successful and will continue.

1. PEIFHA held an Umpiring course for Community and Provincial level umpires. The assigning job was much easier and more umpires available to umpire for 2014 season.
2. Before a season starts we must check the calendar to see the number of days available to play. The 2014 season was very good as Canadian Club soccer tournament, Convention and Thanksgiving were altogether within one week.

3. Transportation: *Didn't appear to be an issue this fall. The problem was solved by a) longer turf time in Cornwall from 4pm-6:30pm on Mondays and Fridays. b) Summerside's turf times started at 5-6:30pm.

4. To cut down on transportation for midget league games for Montague and SIS, we will schedule *a league tournament in early September, 2014 for Cornwall turf.

5. The recommendation from 2012 high school all-star meeting was to schedule the 2013 high school and midget quarter final games so that the team winning would have a school day to practice was well received. For 2014 season this recommendation worked well and *we will continue to do this in the future.

6. A question was asked if we need the 4/5 place playoff game and all coaches answered definitely yes! They felt with field hockey being a new sport to a lot of players that most of the season is used for teaching skills, learning the game and giving each player an opportunity to play throughout the season as they build towards the playoffs. *The 4/5 place game is required!

7. IMPORTANT TO CHECK THE CALENDAR FOR 2015 SEASON. I will check the calendar in August and to see what is available for league games and championships. I will also contact Cornwall to book the Cornwall football turf.

* I RECOMMEND THAT THE 2015 CHAMPIONSHIPS BE HELD THE WEEK OF October 26 to 29, 2015 for both high school and midget field hockey play offs. Mon, Oct 26- High School Semi- Finals (Cornwall); Tues, Oct 27- Midget High School Semi-Finals (Cornwall); Wed, Oct 28 - High School Provincials and Thursday, Oct 29th - Midget Provincial Championships.

8. Uniforms/socks. Wearing the same color of team socks was greatly improved.

B) RECOMMENDATION FOR 2015

PEISAA, and Summerside schools need to meet with Summerside Recreation Dept. on a few issues Re: Canada Games Turf Field for field hockey 1. PEISAA League games for junior high field hockey are played on Tuesdays and Thursdays, while high school games are scheduled for Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays...for the last three seasons this has not happened. Three Oaks' home games for the Summerside turf could only be scheduled on Tuesdays Thursday (as well as SIS home games). With a tight fall schedule, a number of teams could play 3 or 4 games in a row. It would also mean three games could be played on Tues/Thurs (2 midget games and high school game in Summerside) and we do not have the umpires for that many games for a Tues/Thur.

The biggest problem for the Summerside turf is NOT LINED CORRECTLY FOR FIELD HOCKEY. This is the 3rd year season on the turf and Summerside Recreation did not correct the problem. TOSH has work hard to have the problem corrected... but I think they need help from PEISAA in this matter.

I believe as PEISAA Commissioner I should do my best for PEI school athletes and for their sport. For the past number of years I have:

1. Moved as many league games as possible to turf for junior and high school. Teams now play 7 of 8 games on turf. 38 /44 junior high and high school games played this year were on turf. (30 games at Cornwall Turf* and 8 games at Summerside Turf). * Cornwall Football turf
2. In August, 2014 I asked Cornwall Recreation Department to extend Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 3:30 to 6:30pm). Matthew MacAulay has done an excellent job for the last number of years as he was able to book Mondays and Fridays to 6:30pm. Therefore field hockey could 1. Host two high school games per night (only need two officials as both games on the same turf) and 2. Teams traveling were able to play at 5:15pm (so no early buses required).

Junior high turf was booked on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3:30pm to 6pm. We solve getting out of school early by hosting a junior high league tournament.

Again, I would like to thank Matthew McNally for the great job he has done over the last number of years. He has gone out of his way to make the Cornwall turf...home turf for school field hockey. Matthew started a new job in mid Oct..... And there have been number of booking problems since he left Cornwall.

3. As commissioner I have set up the league schedule for junior and senior high schools as there are only few umpires...as I have an understanding of what is required to make the season successful.
4. I have moved both Junior and Senior High School Championships to the Last week of October (*written request in 2013 to PEISAA) but before Halloween night.
5. I have scheduled one playoff per day... re: officials... as we only have a small number of provincial officials to umpire one Championships per day. AS PEISAA commissioner of both midget and high school league...I cannot be in two places at same time.

Monday, - Sir High School Semi Finals (Cornwall)

Tuesday - Junior High School Semi Finals (Cornwall)

Wednesday- Sir High Championships (with PEISAA booking)

Thursday- Junior high School Championships (with PEISAA booking).

* I will request PEISAA to book both (date/ turf) midget and high school Provincial Championships... as they have in the past.

6. As Commissioner I moved Provincial Championships from last Saturday in October (& before Halloween to Wednesday for High School and Thursday for junior many years ago before Halloween because Soccer had so many games on Championship Saturday and we needed our time and place.

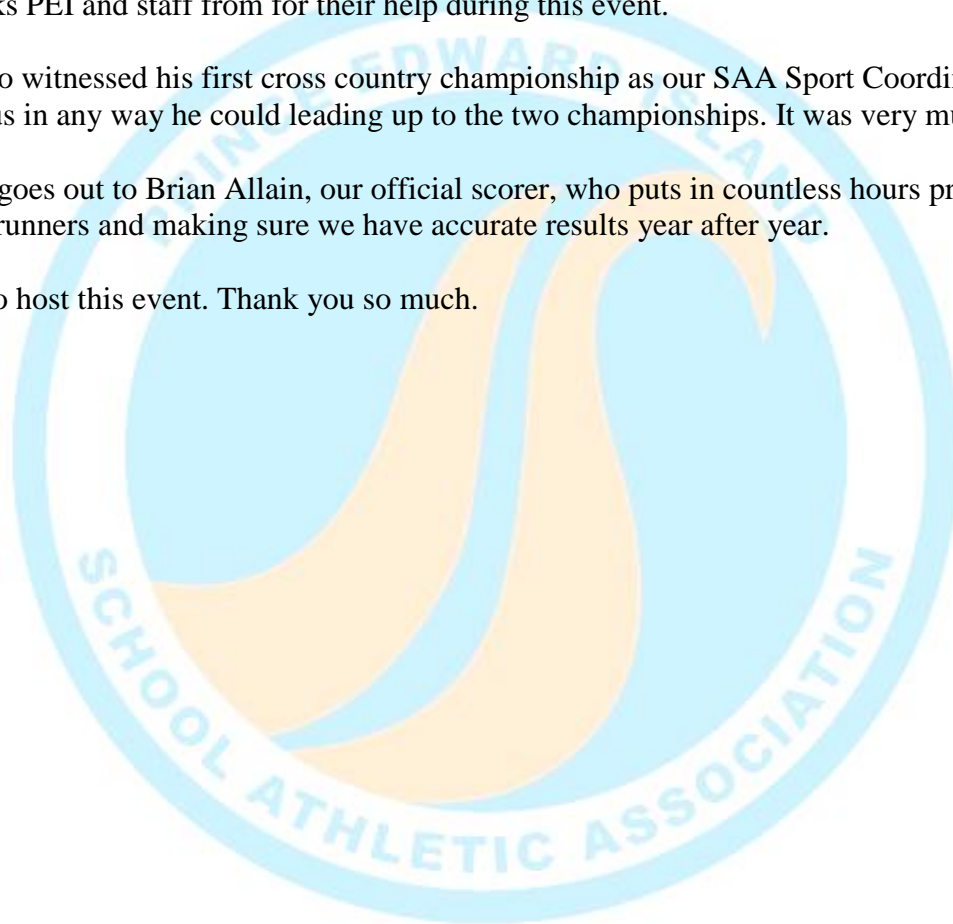

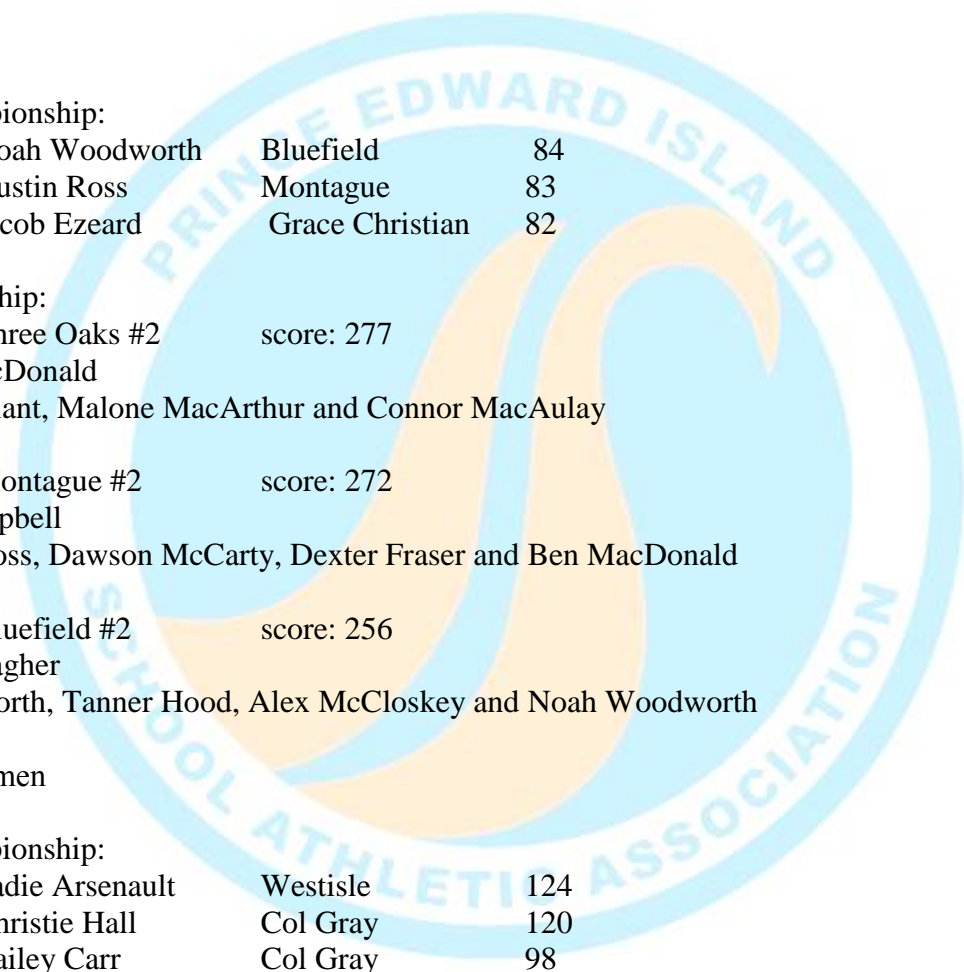

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

The 2014-15 midget golf season proved to be a bit of a challenge, though school started relatively early this year, it seemed that schools were rushed to get their teams picked and then participate in the zone qualifiers. Thanks must go out to Kellie Steele and Rob Connell for coordinating the zone tournaments.

This year 65 boys and 23 girls were involved in the qualifying tournaments with 42 moving on to the Provincials hosted at Summerside Golf Club. Two 9 hole qualifying tournaments were held in each of the competing Divisions. In the west tournaments were held at St Felix and Summerside, while the east held 2 at Belfast Greens. Thanks to Joe Sullivan, Pat Coyle and John Munro for hosting those tourneys.

The championship qualification format used this year had each of the two divisions representing the East and the West sending three teams each plus a few individuals qualifiers to the Provincial Championships. This resulted in 25 boys and 14 girls being involved in the championship. The championship was hosted at Summerside Golf Club with a very reasonable green fee of \$15 being charged for the boy's 18 hole championship and \$10 for the girl's 9 hole championship.

Summerside's Director of Golf, Dallas DesJardin and his staff must be thanked for the terrific work they did to help facilitate the championship.

Thanks to all the coaches for the time they put into this year's golf season, they continue to try and promote the inclusion of girls in their program and the numbers are up, though work needs to be done on skill development. Thanks to Craig Watson for all the advice and administrative help.

Recommendations for next year:

1. Emphasize the importance of administrating the qualifying tournaments through the office of the zone representatives.
2. Maintain the 2 division championship qualification format.
3. With midget schools playing in the fall, it is important that the qualifying tournaments be scheduled in the spring to insure the fall qualification tournament schedule is completed in time for the Provincial Champions
4. The PEISAA has identified the need for all sports administered through the schools to have a season. If golf is going to meet this expectation then schools must commit to playing in at least 2 qualifying

tournaments played on separate dates. There should be time between these qualifiers to allow for some skill development. Realistically, if this is not scheduled than golf at the Midget level should not be a Provincial Championship sport.

5. Establish a Provincial Championship Tournament format that would allow the Holland College 1st year golf administration class the opportunity to help facilitate the championship.

WINTER SPORT REPORTS

PEISAA Senior Basketball Final Report 2014-2015

General Comments

This was the snowiest winter in PEI's recorded history. In spite of this we managed to get a good bit of basketball played. The regular season unfolded as best it could and we were able to get the play-offs in with only one small weather-related interruption.

The men's and ladies leagues saw action with one more team overall for this season. Thirty teams competed in all with a corresponding increase in the number of players. About three hundred and sixty high school students took part.

The Athletic Directors were almost unanimous in advocating and then putting in place a system which saw league play in which any team was able to, but not forced to, schedule games against any other. Teams were asked to try to schedule ten or more games against five or more opponents, if possible. In each of the leagues there were teams who were unable to create this kind of schedule. Sometimes it is just too much to ask for the Ads to schedule games against teams who may be five positions above or below them in the standings.

We need teams to play a number of opponents if we are planning to have a committee seed teams at season's end. Five may be too big a number at this time.

The seeding committee was composed of only three individuals this year-Chris Huggan, Walter MacEwen and myself. In a situation like this one there is pressure on the committee to get it right. Communication and discussion are essential.

Similar to last season, three sets of divisional play-offs were arranged directly from the seedings at the A, AA and AAA levels. Again all teams which competed during the regular season were rewarded with spots in the play-offs. This season, in a change of format from the previous year, only the loser of the A level quarter final was eliminated from play. All other teams in the three leagues continued on the championship trail. This year the AAA quarter-final loser became the #1 seed in the AA division. A similar situation resulted for the AA quarter-final loser as that team became the #1 A seed.

As a result there was quarter-final, semi-final and final action in all divisions male and female. The quarter-final action was hosted by the better ranked team in each case. The A semi-finals and finals were hosted by Charlottetown Rural. The AA semi-finals and finals were hosted by Holland College. The AAA semi-finals and finals were hosted by UPEI.

Once again all stars were chosen by the coaches. The availability of adequate sites and the amount of time prior to March Break precluded the reasonable hosting of All-star games.

Commissioner's recommendations:

1. While Holland College remains a viable consideration as a AAA host, UPEI is the venue of choice at championship time. Policing and washroom considerations are primary reasons. The larger capacity is another potential reason depending on match-ups.
2. Security at the AAA final games is a concern.
3. The play-off system worked well this year. A six team system could work equally as well.
4. An all-star game might still be considered.
5. We should continue to utilize and promote the SAA website.
6. The markings on the gym floors are not current with the rules, but it is a huge project. Still there should be some sort of plan in place.
7. Referee recruitment needs to remain a priority in all PEISAA sports.

General Comments:

Overall, I thought the midget basketball season ran very smoothly. Every game report was faxed to me on time and results were accurate. Any games cancelled were re-scheduled right away. One of the main issues was the amount of regular season games that were asked to be rescheduled due to coaches/schools requests. The storm days did not affect the scheduling until the play-off week which forced me to move the Provincial tournament date.

In November, Garth Turtle facilitated a clinic at Ecole Francois Buote covering the basics of zone and man-to-man defense and what was legal for our midget groups to play. This was organized so our coaches would be familiar with what type of defense was expected at the midget level.

Our Midget “AA” play-offs were cursed with snow days forcing the Provincial dates to be moved and games were played on Saturday, Monday and Wednesday.

Recommendations:

1. Prior to the start of the basketball season, continue to offer a clinic for coaches and referees responsible for the midget games to demonstrate what is a legal man-to-man defense and what is considered a zone defense. If the PEISAA is requesting no zone play then a clear guideline of consequences must be laid out prior to the season.
2. AD's submit the actual game sheet along with the result sheet to the commissioner following a home game. Notes from referees on the games sheets don't always make it on to the results sheet.
3. AD's attending the scheduling meeting must have a clear picture of what divisions their teams belong in and be ready to commit to a schedule. Having knowledge of exams, concerts, school trips, etc. that will impact their schedule, is also a must so once the schedule is set, minimal changes have to be made.
4. Since the high school schedules are made prior to the Intermediate schedules, have a copy of the HS schedules at our meeting and schedule some games on the lighter HS days so our traditional Tuesday/Thursday play days are not so heavy.
5. In scheduling the provincial tournament we must do a better job of avoiding other classifications. A number of parents expressed concern about Midget games being run on the same day as the Sr. games forcing parents to choose between watching their kids in two different divisions.

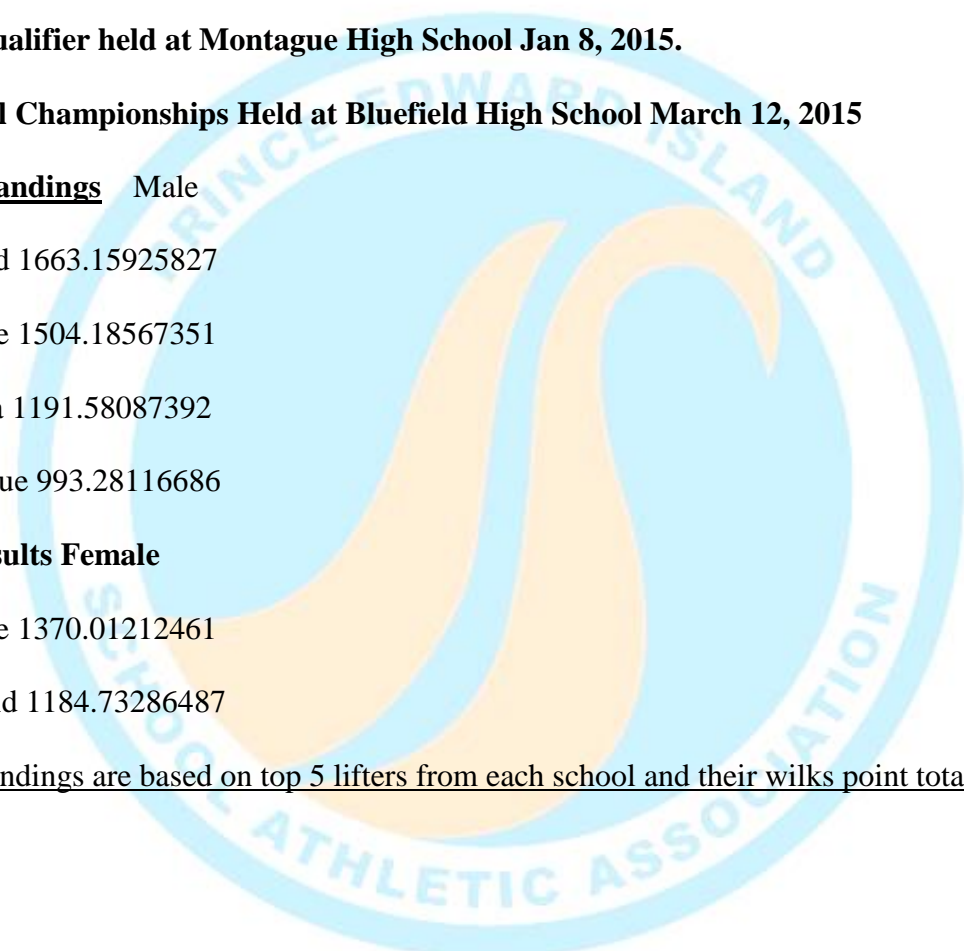

4. General Comments

The 2015 school gymnastics season ended on Saturday, February 28th with the PEI School Athletic Association Provincial Gymnastics Championship at Kensington Intermediate Senior High School. The championship was hosted by St. Louis Elementary School.

Provincial team titles: Pre-Novice Boys- L M Montgomery Elementary, Pre-Novice Girls- Spring Park Elementary - Novice Girls- West Kent Elementary, Novice Boys- Montague Consolidated, Bantam Girls - Montague Intermediate and Midget Girls- Montague Intermediate. Individual awards were also given to the top six vault /floor routines and top ten all around.

A total of 285 gymnasts participated at this year's event. This was a decrease of 20 gymnasts from last year. The biggest drop was with the pre novice and novice boys categories.

On Saturday morning the competition started and finished on time. A total of 130 gymnasts participated with 84 Pre-Novice Girls and 46 Pre-Novice Boys. Decrease of 18 gymnasts.

On Saturday afternoon, another big crowd watched 123 gymnasts perform in the Novice boys and Novice girls categories, (40 Novice boys and 83 Novice girls). Decrease of 4.

The late afternoon competition had a total of 32 gymnasts participate in Bantam boys and girls, Midget boys and girl's categories, 5 Bantam boys, 17 Bantam girls, 1 Midget boy and 9 Midget girls. Increase of 2.

All information and results were posted in the two local papers and two radio stations. The media coverage before and after was very good. All results were circulated to all the media, schools and on our SAA website within days of our championship.

We had a total of 24 different schools from across PEI participate with a total of 285 gymnasts.

The championship was postponed on the original weekend of February 21st due to bad weather on Friday night and early Saturday morning. We were able to secure the Provincial site for the following weekend Saturday the 28th.

We had a total of 421 paid spectators. This was a decrease of 53 paid spectators.

Our computer program which calculated the results came through for us again. Within minutes of the end of both competitions, the results were handed out. Thank you so much to Leisa Nogler who helped with the presentation of all our awards.

I would like to say a special thank you to Craig Watson and the SAA executive for your support in helping with the rescheduling of the championship to the following weekend. I would like to say a special thank you to Gerald MacCormack for his help in securing janitors for the two weekends. The championship would not have happened without his help.

I would also like to thank Principal Donald Milligan and Phys. Ed. Teacher Brett Corcoran for all their help and continuous support. Thank you for allowing us to use your fine facility to host our Provincial Championship. It is very much appreciated.

We can't forget PEI School milk Foundation for their continuous support and of course for the free chocolate milk for all the competitors.

Thank you to all the Unit managers for hosting their own zone competitions and sending me all the results on time. I would like to say a special thank you to all the Phys. Ed. teachers for supporting me and the change of date of our championship. It was greatly appreciated. It's always a pleasure to work with such dedicated professionals. Great job!

5. **Recommendations for improving the sport:**

1. Would like to see if we could host the Pre Novice and Novice Girls categories in the morning and the Pre Novice and Novice Boys and along with the Bantam and Midget categories in the afternoon.
2. Educate the gymnastics coaches to the new judging system coming in next year in PEISAA Gymnastics .The Junior Olympic Program adopted by Gymnastics PEI is already here now but we decided that judges would not implement the new deductions this year.
3. Go over the new JO Program and see if we could adopt new skills for our students to use next year.



PEISAA Wrestling Final Report 2014-2015

1. General Comments

The 2015 PEISAA Wrestling Championships were held on Friday evening for the Bantam and Midget divisions and on Saturday for the Novice competitors. The site was Montague Regional High School. The tournament was run on 3 mats.

The on mat official situation was very strong. Of the five, three were of a national ranking. This was one of the success factors for the tournament. The officials went out of their way to ensure the athletes were safe and interacted w/ the athletes, allowing them to feel at ease. There was **one minor injury** over the 2 days of wrestling (bruised shoulder). Our officials did an excellent job.

The parents, friends and former wrestlers from the Montague schools' wrestling community were top notch volunteers and are quite knowledgeable about the sport of wrestling. Our minor officials, score keepers, timers and hosts ('crowd control') allowed for a very smoothly run event. Volunteers run this sport and, as commissioner and coach, I can't thank them enough. Spectators and parents of school wrestling are becoming more accustomed to staying in the bleachers and/or viewing areas and staying off the mats. Parents on the floor / mats creates several problems – crowding / safety concerns, competition anxiety in the wrestlers, issues w/ outdoor footwear on their wooden gymnasium floor and inability to view what's actually happening! I was very pleased with the flow of the event and MRHS is an ideal venue.

Participation numbers at the intermediate and senior high level continue to be a weakness. In particular, all schools reported the weather being an even bigger issue this year and several practices were cancelled as a result. There continues to be a keen interest in developing a Pre-Novice division and including them at an age appropriate level of competition in PEISAA competition.

The changes to the scoring system that were implemented last year continued to be a non-issue this year. This was primarily due to the flexibility of the coaches involved. For example, a standing double leg take down to the back is worth four points and scoring is cumulative with 2 rounds and a half time break as opposed to best 2 out of 3 rounds.

Overall, this was a very successful event, despite Tim Murphy's absence! Big thanks to Dave Matthews (Gulf Shore) for doing the draw. The biggest challenge is to continue to develop the sport into the Intermediate / senior high schools. Having a teacher / coach w/in the school seems

to determine the longevity and success of a program and helps to retain athletes. Unfortunately, when that teacher leaves the school, the program stops.

2. Recommendations

1. Review the possibility of a Pre-Novice division.
2. Encourage more girls to continue wrestling into intermediate school by offering a camp in the fall or sometime in January 2016 for girls only.
3. Offer coaching development opportunities in Oct / Nov 2015 for interested teachers and members of the community to develop school wrestling (target area: Western PEI and elementary school level in Charlottetown and Summerside).
4. Continue to encourage schools to participate in the PEI Open, NB Open, NS Open and the Maritime Wrestling Festival (Moncton, NB). In particular, the PEI Open (end of March) and the Maritime Wrestling Festival (end of April in Moncton) are a perfect complement to what's already happening on PEI. This April, Tignish Elementary and East Wiltshire joined teams from the Montague and Charlottetown area at the Maritime Wrestling Festival, demonstrating growth in our program. These connections were made at the Provincials!
5. Participate in NBIAA sanctioned high school tournaments in 2015 - 2016, allowing grade 9 wrestlers to join their feeder high school's wrestling team to take part.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

The PEISAA/Black Knight provincial badminton championships were held on Thursday April 23 and Saturday April 25, at 5 Summerside and area locations.

Championship titles in novice, bantam, midget, juvenile and senior boys' and girls' categories were all up for grabs in singles, doubles and mixed play. Most of our Island schools were represented in zone playoffs, with the top two from the four zones advancing to the provincials.

Matt Barlow from Three Oaks was victorious in senior boy's singles defeating Connor Jinks from Charlottetown Rural 21-10 and 21-12 to win the provincial title. Zack Visser of Colonel Gray defeated Brohan Brennan of Three Oaks 16-21, 21-17 and 21-12 to claim the senior boys bronze medal. In doubles action Matt Barlow along with Connor Loerick from TOSH defeated Connor Jinks and Mark Lloyd 21-13 and 21-9 to win the title. The bronze medal was won by Bluefield. Spencer Beaton and Alex McCloskey defeated Mark Morrison and Jonah Wilton from Montague 16-21, 21-17 and 21-15. With a first in singles, a first in doubles and a fourth in singles, Three Oaks easily won the provincial title with 11 points.

In girls' action, Tiffany Cameron of Three Oaks finished off her dominant career in girl's badminton with a win over Samantha Lawther of Francois Buote 21-15 and 21-12 to win the senior girls provincial singles championship. Jada Yeo of Gray defeated Emma Hughes of Evangeline 21-15 and 21-18 to claim the bronze medal in singles. Sophie Dougay and Samantha Lawther of Francois Buote defeated Jenna Mae Ellsworth and Jada Yeo of Gray 21-19 and 21-5 to win the senior girls doubles championship. Adele Arsenault and Emma Hughes of Evangeline defeated Kaylan Ellsworth and Sami Sentner of Westisle 10-21, 21-13 and 21-10 to claim the bronze medal. Francois Buote won the provincial championship with a total of 8 points.

Senior Mixed Doubles champions this year were Tiffany Cameron and Connor Loerick from Three Oaks. They defeated Kaylan Ellsworth and Jake Shea from Westisle 21-17 and 21-18. Kalece O'Regan and Nathan Phillips from Bluefield defeated Sami Sentner and Josh Niyonkuru of Westisle 21-11 and 21-17 to win the bronze medal. Three Oaks wins the senior mixed provincial title with 5 points.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVING SPORT

Having the championships in the Summerside schools worked very well this year. Using 5 schools on Thursday night was challenging, but it worked. It can work again next year. Saturday went very smooth at all three locations. Having the championship on Thursday and Saturday gives the athletes a chance to rest before the finals. We should do this again next year for the fourth year in a row.

Having players report scores if they were going to a third game on the Thursday night; worked very well. This way the first two game scores were accurate and if they have to go to a tie breaker, correct scores were used. It should be used in future zones and provincials.

Since we have a rest day Friday, there is time to send in reports to the commissioner from the five sites on Thursday night. The commissioner can then send a final wrap up to the province on

Friday to make sure all players are ready to go on Saturday. This way we should have no miscommunications at our championship sites.

Using UPEI on Saturday is the goal for next year. This way we can have all players in one location and it will enhance our championship.

Next year, regional qualifiers should be used in Juvenile and Senior divisions (both singles, doubles and mixed) to determine who makes provincials. This will create a better balance between the east and the west and should get the best players to provincials.

Lastly, there needs to be a review of championship points as there is too many ties for championships every year. I plan on finding a solution before next season.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

This rugby season was another successful one. Student-athletes from all across the Island competed in 3 divisions in men's and women's championships. As with every school sport, it would not have been possible without countless hours of work by players, coaches, referees and Athletic Directors. A special thank you goes to Craig Watson in his first year as the new School Sport Coordinator and helping out behind the scenes. Also, thank you to Tim Hockin in his first year as Referee Assignor. Credit should also be given to Joel Arsenault and Darcy Harris for their work in hosting successful A and AA provincial championships. Another thank you goes to UPEI and UPEI Athletic Director Chris Huggan for allowing us to host our AAA championships at their site. There are many other people who are very important to the continued success of high school rugby on PEI and I thank them as well.

Every year in A rugby has the same general storyline but it is still great to watch every year. The players start as athletes with little knowledge of the game and transform into players who understand what to. The 8s version of the game is also important in helping the student-athletes to adjust to playing a contact sport while maintaining the safety and sportsmanship aspects that each coach is expected to teach. Both A leagues came down to very competitive

championships with Charlottetown Rural defeating Three Oaks in overtime in the women's final and Colonel Gray defeating Three Oaks in the men's final.

In the AA division, Kensington had a very successful season despite having only 18 players by making the final in the David Voyer Memorial tournament in May and winning the AA men's championship. Both AA championship games were 2-point games with Westisle winning the women's and Kensington winning the men's. The circumstances presented themselves on a few occasions for us to use the 11s variation of rugby again. I am a big supporter of this variation as an intermediary between 8s and 15s.

In the AAA regular season, both men's and women's divisions were very competitive and tightly matched. In the AAA championships, Colonel Gray beat Charlottetown Rural a very high level game in the men's final while Three Oaks beat Colonel Gray in the women's final.

This season, we seemingly abandoned the game sheet submission by fax, email or text message. There were very few cases of games not being entered on the PEISAA website, which I was quite pleased with. However game sheets must be submitted in case there are disputes or the requirement of disciplinary action following a game. I believe that sending in game sheets via text message or email is by far the easiest method.

Walter MacEwen is an incredible resource for our league with the work he does with the PEISAA website and the submission of scores to media outlets. The Results Grid on the website is a wonderful asset that he keeps up to date the entire season.

Thank you to everyone for your continued work to make high school rugby a success.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVING SPORT

- PEI Rugby does not have enough qualified referees. It has been an issue for a long time, but has gotten steadily worse over the past 5 years. This was the first time in many years that a game was cancelled because there were no officials available to do a game. If there is any way for the PEISAA to work with the rugby union for referee recruitment and training it NEEDS to be done.
- Game sheets need to be sent in. They are not, and any time disciplinary action is required or being discussed, we run into problems because the commissioner does not have the game sheet.
- Referees need to send in yellow and red card reports. The player sent off form is for red cards only. Yellow cards require an email saying the player's name, team, and the reason for card. We have a cumulative card discipline system that does not work if the commissioner is not made aware of cards.
- Once again, I suggest that we hold a Guidelines, key rules and question session before the beginning of the season for coaches and referees to attend. Many coaches and referees are not familiar with the Guidelines. This leads to issues when we get to playoffs and all rules supposed to be fully enforced. My suggestion would be that this would be held by Darryl, Tim, and/or Lloydie and they would review key safety points, any rule changes, and areas that have caused confusion in recent years (i.e. timeouts, overtime format, etc.). I would ask that all coaches and referees attend, but at least 1 representative from each school be required to attend this session.

GENERAL COMMENTS:

The 4th Annual PEISAA Triton was held on May 18, 2015. Students from twelve schools swam, biked and ran the course at Credit Union Place, the Summerside boardwalk, Rufus St., Mackenzie Dr., Notre Dame St., and Northumberland St.

Triathlon Directors, CJ Studer and Cheryl Tanton registered 70 triathletes from bantam through to senior and PEITF Members for the event. Cheryl Tanton, head official, was also aided by lifeguards, police, and fire personnel and adult volunteers on the road.

As safety is of utmost concern, trained first aid personnel were present, with key individuals always in radio communication. Pathways were swept clean and detailed course information was given at the athlete's pre event meeting. The Summerside Police and Fire Departments were informed of the event and assisted in securing the road sections of the triathlon. Due to a sudden death in the firefighting community we were informed that the use of the fire truck was no longer an option so the City of Summerside allowed us to use a city truck to secure the road.

As this is an event that celebrates the intrinsic value of sport, there were no Provincial Champions declared or banners awarded. Each triathlete received a Triton t-shirt as they finished the course. Times were taken to give the athletes a goal for improvement next year. No times were shared among the schools or zones, thus no results were published. Each participant is a champion in their own right.

This model of participation is foundational in the sport of triathlon and is a model in which the race directors feel very strongly about.

The adopted model of registering and prepaying prior to the triathlon made registration on the morning of the event run smoothly.

The facilities at Credit Union Place and the surrounding community of Summerside worked perfectly for this event. With unwavering support from the Summerside Chief of Police and the City's event staff/barricades and truck, appropriate roads were blocked off and the course was made secure for our triathletes.

The Triton could not be delivered if it were not for the work of the army of volunteers from Athena, Summerside Intermediate, Three Oaks, and dedicated parents/adults and teachers. They are critical to the success of the event and provided educational opportunities and service learning hours for these students.

This event is also a partnership with Triathlon PEI. This event needs their support through the use of their equipment. We would also like to mention the continued support of Clark's Toyota. This event has been extensively covered by the media and has been a very positive experience for the athletes, teachers, volunteers, and spectators.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. With the partial open course design of the bike/run course, more adults are needed to support high traffic areas.

Therefore it is recommended that along with the vast number of youth volunteers, more adult volunteers be sought after.

2. The teacher's solo and relay division which was newly added to the event was a success so it is recommended this continue.

3. The majority of schools who have entered triathletes have been doing so for the past three years. It would be a pleasure to see an expansion of schools register in the triathlon and create a community of student triathletes in the province.

4. In some schools, the triathlon information relayed to the AD's is not being passed on to all students/teachers in their schools. Upon discussions, teachers and students who may have been interested in the triathlon have said that they had no information about the event.

Therefore it is recommended that the provided triathlon information be relayed by the AD's to all staff and students who are eligible to participate in the Triton triathlon.

In all, the Triton triathlon has become a successful annual event due to the participating triathletes and the unwavering support of our local volunteers and the PEISAA and its many partners.
