PEISAA Senior Soccer FINAL REPORT - 2024

Commissioner: (Andrew MacAdam)

1. SPORT PARTICIPATION NUMBERS

Male 9 A (Up from 7 teams last year) and 6 AAA (Same as last year) teams and approximately **270 players**. **Female** 7 A (Up from 6 teams last year) teams and 6 AAA teams (Same as last year) and approximately **220 players**.

2. GENERAL COMMENTS

The 2024 Fall Soccer Season was a five-and-a-half-week sprint to Provincials on October 25/26. We had very few interruptions in games this fall (Note in recommendations). Unlike last year, the weather was very cooperative. All 4 leagues were generally competitive, with a team or two in each division struggling in the standings. The playoffs brought about some one upset in each division in the quarter finals. Game reporting has been very good again this year, using the Goal Line web site. The number of red cards seems to be down this year as there seemed to be a cycle of athletes who were less interested in soccer over the past couple years. There have been more yellow cards reported, on the other hand! I am not 100% confident cards are being reported as consistent as they could be (just a feeling, nothing to back it up). We only postponed one game this year due to official availability. This year, I had 31 officials working games, which is more than I have had in any year since I took over assigning, which was great. We had 3 more teams than in the past, so there were more games as well. Thanks goes out to our sponsors, The Department of Education and Early Years, The PEI School Milk Foundation, Grant Thornton, and Eastlink Community Television. A big thanks goes out to Mike Connolly and Phil Bridges, the School Sport Coordinator for all his help throughout the season.

3. RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We struggle to compete with the FC Program and what it does to our schedule each year. We are also hosting a National Championship next year leading up to Thanksgiving. This could have an impact on officials for the week of the competition, as some of our officials will probably be involved.
2. The schedule for Provincials needs to be changed slightly. We are starting too early on the Friday, as we conflict with Eliot River's bussing schedule, and they use the turf fields during the daytime for PE Classes. We could play the Intermediate A Soccer Bronze Medal games on the Thursday, and continue with the rest of the schedule on Friday starting at 3:15 and 3:30. Another option would be to play 2 Bronze Medal games on Saturday morning, and extend the day until around 6:00 pm.
3. I will put this in here again this year: To ease cost to schools and easing of officials, I would recommend going to one Saturday in September, where we could schedule 6 games at the same venue (Bluefield offered 4 years ago). It could work, if players and coaches would make a commitment to play one game at a central location in mid – to – late September.
4. Card reporting still needs to be addressed. 2Using a Google form to share is only as good as the person who gets the information in a timely manner. Sometimes coaches get game sheets to the AD a few days late, and cards were assessed that need attention. Can we look at reporting on Goalline (if that is a possibility) Presently, I rely on an email or text after games indicating cards given out or if there were no cards. This has proven to be very ineffective, as AD's are asking if certain players are to sit out games, and I have no record of any cards
5. We had a couple very heavy-scheduled days when it was impossible to fill assignments and a couple games were postponed, and in one case a coach refereed his own team and the

assistant coach took on the coaching responsibilities. It gets very tough to fill assignment in areas where there are very few officials (ie: Morell, Souris, Montague) and until there are more available in those communities, we will struggle. If we can at all possible have limited number of games on the same night in those areas, that would be great!

6. I am leaving the following suggestions for the Sport Regulations regarding cards (**I was not involved in any discussion around this, so I am not sure if it was addressed**):

DISCIPLINE CARDS (SOCCER)

1. When a player receives 3 yellow cards during the season - (exhibition, regular season, and tournament games) he/she will sit the next scheduled game, tournament included.
2. Player's accumulated yellow cards will revert back to zero when the playoffs begin.
3. A red card is an automatic one game suspension, depending on severity the suspension could be longer. If a player picks up a red card or a third yellow card on the last game before playoffs they would sit the first playoff game. Red card offenses also continue into playoffs.
 - a. Serious Foul Play and Violent Conduct offenses will be longer than the one game and can expect a discipline committee to convene (either in person, or via email) to review the referee's report to consider the length of the suspension, expect it to be more than the one game.
 - b. Verbal Abuse of officials will be an automatic 2 games suspension.
 - c. Physical abuse of an official will be dealt with by a discipline committee.
 - d. Spitting on another player will be automatic 2 games suspension.
 - e. Denying an Obvious Goal Scoring Opportunity will be a one game suspension.
 - f. Using offensive, insulting, or abusive language will be a one game suspension. In the case of racial insults, a discipline committee will convene.
 - g. A second caution in the same game will result in a one game suspension.

Note: All suspensions do not include the game the player is ejected, no matter the time of the ejection.

4. Also, add to the policy handbook: In the event where players were red carded before the championship games: In most FIFA competitions, a player does not sit on the bench for the games they are suspended. However, we are running our competitions, and we should be able to allow or disallow players to sit on the bench for Championship games only, as there will be team pictures after the game. I believe the ability to sit on the bench with his/her team mates, should be left to the discretion of the PEISAA and commissioner.

Below is a summary of the medal games.

Note: The weather on Friday was very windy (gust up to 70 km/h) cool and overcast (4 degrees C). Saturday's weather started out sunny and calm, however, the wind picked up around noon (not as bad as Friday!) and the sun disappeared. (7 degrees C)

PEISAA Senior Soccer Championships – October 25/26, 2024

Terry Fox Complex, Cornwall, PE

Senior A Women Bronze Medal – Bluefield 2 – Three Oaks 1 (PKs)

Bluefield opened the scoring at the 3 minute mark on a goal from Katelynn Peters which stood for the rest of the half. Seven minutes into the second half, Three Oaks' Julie Beatscheider beat Bluefield keeper Maven LaVoie. Teams exchanged chances in the wind-blown field at the Terry Fox Complex, but no more goals were scored. The game went to penalty kicks and Bluefield made the best of their chances scoring on all chances while Three Oaks were not able to cash in on their shots.

Senior A Men Bronze Medal – Charlottetown Rural 1 – Kinkora 0

Charlottetown Rural's Omar Salman scored at the 27 minute mark and that is all Rural needed to hang on to win the Senior A Men's Bronze Medal. Kinkora pushed hard with the wind on their back in the second half, but could not beat Rural's Keeper Jude Neitz.

Senior AAA Women Bronze Medal – Charlottetown Rural – 4, Westisle – 0

Charlottetown Rural scored early in the game to take a 1-0 lead on a goal by Maiya Chaudary, and they did not look back, having scored 2 more goals by Sadie Hansen by the half to take a 3-0 lead into the halftime break. The second half saw Westisle fight hard, however, Rural's keeper, Maya Fisher, kept them off the scoreboard. Chaudary scored another goal midway through the second half to finish the Rural scoring.

Senior AAA Men Bronze Medal – Charlottetown Rural 7 – Westisle 1

Charlottetown Rural scored 5 goals in the first half off the feet of Liam Moore, Matthew Rooney, Dalton Gas, Campbell Dunn, and an own goal on their way to a 7-1 victory and the Bronze Medal. In the second half, Jack Callaghan score 2 more for Rural and Jared Kenan scored late in the game for Westisle to ruin the shutout bid by Rural.

Senior A Women Gold Medal – Souris 2 – Charlottetown Rural 0

Souris Spartans scored early in the second half to go up 1-0 after a scoreless first half. Lexi Carter scored what turned out to be the winning goal and Souris carried most of the play the remainder of the game. Their Pressure would pay off as an own goal was cored at the 88th minute mark and Kate MacPhee would earn the shutout as Souris would win the Gold Medal.

Senior A Men Gold Medal – Col. Gray 2 – Souris 0

Col Gray and Souris played a scoreless first half in the Senior Men's Division soccer provincials. Souris' keeper Gage MacIntyre and Gray's Lincoln Scott were up to the task of keeping the ball out of the net. However, at the 67-minute mark, Gray's Mikha Toro broke the tie, which would prove to be the winning goal. With 2 minutes left on the clock, Toro added an insurance marker to seal the Gold Medal for Col. Gray.

Senior AAA Women Gold Medal – Bluefield – 1, TOSH – 0

The lower-seeded Bluefield AAA Women defeated Three Oaks 1-0 to repeat as Provincial Champions. Bluefield's Lyla Arsenault broke the score with a goal at the 19-minute mark after squeezing the ball through the legs of Tosh Keeper Mila Mahar. Both teams carried the play evenly throughout the game, however, Bluefield Keeper Josie MacLean was able to keep TOSH off the board.

Senior AAA Men Bronze Medal – Bluefield – 3, Col. Gray – 0

Bluefield came into the game as the top seed team by 1 point over Col. Gray in the regular season. The Bobcats were determined to continue to be the number one team and scored at the 13 minute mark off the foot of Johnny Mahar. The game was a well-contested match as both teams had their chances. However, Bluefield's Owen Arsenault and Gray's Ethan Goessels stopped the rest of the attempts in the first half. With Bluefield up 1-0 at the start of the second half, James Toombs would score a second goal at the 58 minute mark to give the Bobcats some insurance. With Col. Gray pushing to score and have a chance to win, Bluefield took advantage of a pushing-forward Gray team and Jonathan Kent scored another Bluefield goal at the 77 minute mark to go up 3-0. Col. Gray were not going down easy as Seth Lawless would put the Colonels on the board with 5 minutes left in the game. That would be how the game would finish and the Bobcats stealing the Provincial Championship from the defending champions.

3. GENERAL COMMENTS

I believe it was a very successful year for PEISAA Soccer leagues. Thanks to the many people who have helped keep things organized, Mike Connolly, Allister Smith, Phil Bridges, Walter MacEwen and each school's athletic directors and referee assignors.

This year, we had 15 "A" girls teams, 16 "A" boys teams, 5 "AA" girls teams, and 6 "AA" boys teams. The leagues were competitive across the board.

In the West leagues, we had 6 "A" girls teams with SIS #1 joining the East to play in the AA league. The boys had 5 teams compete in the "A" league with SIS playing in the "AA" league this year.

Having all the Provincials at one site (Terry Fox Complex) was a huge success as the weather was decent and I recommend we stay at this venue for future years.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS

A) Game Reporting

- 1) All schools should continue to follow the reporting guidelines set down by the PEISAA.
- 2) Each home team is responsible for putting the results online following the game.

4. General Comments

The Pre-Novice - Intermediate Cross-Country season ended on Saturday October 19th at the 2024 Source for Sports Provincial Cross-Country Championship at Mill River. The Westisle Family of Schools hosted the Pre- Novice to Intermediate Championships. Rural High School hosted the Juvenile to Senior categories at Charlottetown Rural High October 15th.

The weather did cooperate at the Mill River and Rural site this year with sunny and warm weather all day.

A total of 643 runners ran the three different competitive courses at Mill River. This was an increase of 45 runners from 2023. A total of 56 schools did participate this year.

The Juvenile /Senior Championships were held at Charlottetown Rural High School on Tuesday, October 15th supervised by meet manager Stanly Chaisson. A total of 135 runners ran the 2 courses also on good weather. This was an increase of 8 runners from 2023. A total of 12 schools participated this year.

The Juvenile and Senior Championship was also a great success. Meet manager Stanley Chaisson was very pleased with a great turnout and total increased numbers.

Thank you to Stan, for your excellent leadership skills with the hosting of the Juvenile and Senior Provincial Championships at Rural

The overall PEISAA Provincial Championship participation numbers were 778 runners.

At the Mill River site all 3 courses the 1.5 km, 2.0 km and the 3.0 km all had demanding hills and open fields that offered a very competitive course for all runners. This new course with the start and finish lines switched made it friendlier for spectators to watch the final 140 meters dash.

All races started on time and finished on time despite having to wait for competition numbers for a couple of runners that had no school rep. present.

Mike made sure Stan and I had everything we needed to run a successful Championship including two SAA tents, one for admission and one for the awards. Great investment for the SAA.

The awards were presented after each race. I would like to thank Stan for helping with announcing the presentation of awards, great job for your first time.

The results were sent to the media Tuesday from both provincials. I also sent the results Mike to post on the SAA web site.

Special thanks to Lincoln Rix, Rachel Doucet and Stan Chaisson for their help, along with the leadership students from Hernewood Intermediate, M E Callaghan Jr. High and, Charlottetown Rural. The success of our two championships is directly related to the responsible work done by these students' leaders and their teachers.

Thanks to all the zone reps. and meet managers for making sure Stan and I received the proper results from their zone championships. Your efforts and commitment help make our SAA Provincial a great success.

A word of thanks goes out to Brian Allain, our official scorer, who puts in countless hours preparing the registration of all runners and taking care of the results year after year.

It was a real honor to host this great championship once again for the 20th year.

5. Recommendations for improving the sport:

- The SAA purchase a portable printer to hook up to the computer at the Rural Championships.
- Overall, missing 36 runners at Juvenile and Senior Provincials. Numbers might be less if the chosen date was not the Tuesday after Thanksgiving.
- Overall, missing 202 runners at Pre-Novice -Intermediate provincial. Might be time to enforce the SAA Withdrawal fines of \$10.00 per athlete to schools whose athletes fail to participate in the qualifying event after the withdrawal deadline.
- Look at finding a program that would help with the results at the finish line. This program could rank and record times as runners cross the finish line. All runners would be ranked in the order they finish, team ranking would be calculated and personal times would be printed as the last runner crosses the line. All this work is done by hand and subsequently not all runners are timed.

4. General Comments

The host of provincial championships (Ryan Garrett) requested that we seek an alternative location at least every two years, based on a single provincial course open at that time and limiting each year's member playing date. Four qualifiers were held, with golfers needing to play in one to be eligible for provincials; Eagles Glenn and Mill River were only half-filled with golfers, whereas Fox Meadow and Avondale were full. A request was made for additional qualifiers; however, I did not see a need for one.

5. Recommendations

There need to be guidelines set for golf within the policy handbook for qualification, the number of golfers eligible to play in qualifiers, and discussion on qualification to provincials (team sizes - potentially three golfer teams and top two scores count similar to Canada Games). I have requested that ADs speak with coaches to provide feedback for future years. Before qualifier tournaments, teams must have tryouts instead of using the qualifier as their tryout.

In previous years, communication was directly through commissioner(s) and coaches, and there was a lack of communication with athletic directors, heard from many coaches throughout the season - that ADs were unaware of - in the future, coaches will need reminders of "new protocol."

6. League and Championship Results

The provincial championships were held at Brudenell - it was a great day for golf - 10am shotgun. Ryan was a great help with organizing and running the event; he had scorecards prepared with names and starting holes on them, and coaches were a great help in leading golfers out to their starting holes. Coaches were asked this year to monitor the athletes versus in previous years of playing themselves. It was beneficial having coaches watch many groups throughout the day and check in with groups to ensure

things were going well, and it helped with the pace of play. There were only two groups of 4 golfers in the draw after multiple dropouts the morning of, with some discussion perhaps provincials are played in groups of 3, which would give a maximum of 108 golfers to try and keep the round time under 5 hours.

The competition for the provincial championship in the team event was all very close, A men (team scores) was one shot between first and second and one shot between second and third, with Morell winning the banner, Gray won AAA men for the first time since 2011, and Montague claimed the women's banner. Individually, there were some excellent scores posted, with Hunter Crozier (Bluefield) winning overall with a smooth 73, Breyah MacDonald (Montague) winning by one shot in the women's with a score of 86 and Cameron McCardle (Evangeline) winning the A men's competition with a score of 81.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

Once again, the Intermediate Golf Provincial Championships were held at Avondale Golf Course on October 9th, 2024. We were fortunate to have excellent weather and received tremendous support from Connor Lea and his staff at the course. This year the field boasted 59 individual competitors from across the island as well as a total of 28 teams competing in the team scramble portion. Both of these numbers are an increase from last year, which is great to see.

In the individual girls play, Birchwood dominated with a first and second place finish. East Wiltshire finished third and Queen Charlotte came in fourth place. As for the team scramble portion of the girls' tournament, Birchwood also finished first, with Queen Charlotte placing second, M.E.

Callaghan coming third and Montague finishing in fourth place. Such strong performances in both the individual and team play had Birchwood taking home the provincial championship banner by a landslide.

The individual boys play was very close seeing Grace Christian take first place after a tie break using retrogression. Birchwood then finished strongly taking second, third, and fourth place. First place and fourth place were only separated by a total of three strokes. There was some very strong play in the boys field. As for the team scramble portion of the boys' competition, it was once again Birchwood finishing in first place with a score of eight strokes under par! Grace Christian took home second place followed by Stonepark in third and M.E. Callaghan in fourth. Birchwood also won the provincial championship banner in the boys' competition.

Overall, the day ran very well. There was plenty of help from the course staff at Avondale, as well as the volunteers and coaches from participating schools. We kept the same format as last year in the scramble portion of the event, with two groups of three playing together on each hole. This allows for an increased degree of accountability and also provides insight into opponent's scores.

We did run into some egregiously slow pace of play on the girls side of the team scramble. There were two groups that surpassed the four hour mark with two holes to play. That pace of play is unacceptable and had to be addressed by PEISAA staff. This led us to having to present the boys banner and medals prior to all girls finishing their round. This is something that we would like to avoid going forward. One housekeeping issue that should be noted is the number of teams that handed in scorecards that were not completed fully or unverified by other playing partners. It will be paramount moving forward that this point be emphasized at the beginning of both the individual as well as the scramble portion of the championship. It should also be noted that Birchwood made a last-minute substitution on their second female scramble team, citing an unknown last minute vacation. This substitution violated the PEISAA substitution rules as the fill-in player did not compete in the individual portion of the zone 3 meet. The substitution was discussed at length by the commissioner and PEISAA personnel and ultimately it was decided that the substitution would be permitted, given that there was no other team to take their place through the zone qualifier and with the idea of game-growth in mind. It was explicitly stated that this was a one-time occurrence and was not to set precedent moving forward. The Birchwood coach and Athletic Director were both made aware of the circumstances surrounding the substitution exemption.

Recommendations for next year:

1. Maintain same format of play for provincial championships with an emphasis on pace of play.
2. Have team coaches check scorecards with players to avoid handing in incomplete or incorrect cards.
3. Reinforce early in season the rules for substitutions for players that are unable to compete in the provincials. Coaches should ensure all players can attend the provincial championships prior to selecting their teams.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

All Intermediate and Senior High medal games were held in one location at Holland College. This continues to create a better Championship experience for fans, players and coaches. Once again, I have received too many reports of technical / unsportsmanlike fouls in my opinion, especially at the A and AA Men's Senior High Level. I believe the officials are doing a better job at making sure they are reported to the Assignor, Gerard MacDonald. We had a total of 42 Technical Fouls and 16 Unsportsmanlike fouls at the Senior High Level . Also, 39 Technical fouls and 21 Unsportsmanlike fouls at the Intermediate level. I am concerned about the behavior of some of our coaches and players. But I am also concerned about the game management of some of our officials. Something that also seems to compound this, is poor score tables at some gyms. Athletic Directors and coaches need to understand on any given day there can be multiple games going and they may not always get the best officials. This is especially the case when we have lost plays days due to storms.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVEMENT

1. 20pt half-court defense rule for Play-offs / Regular season, should be in Policy Handbook.
2. Continue to ensure the officials know the importance of reporting all technical and unsportsmanlike fouls to the assignor/ commissioner.
3. Athletic directors need to make sure they are taking the time to properly train their tables. A poorly run table can have a dramatic effect on the game. Being present early in the season will help with this.
4. The PEISAA should consider supplying funds for senior officials to be paid to evaluate younger or less experienced officials throughout the season to offer important feedback.
5. The Sports Coordinator should meet with AD's at the beginning of the basketball season to remind them they have the responsibility to ensure their coaches are behaving correctly in the educational setting of school sports and that the AD's are responsible for making sure the coaches know it's their responsibility to control the behavior of their players. The game needs to be played with integrity. We had

games this season where teams were making a mockery of the game and coaches were not addressing it with the players. The presence of AD's at games, especially early in the season would aid in this.

6. In my opinion, if you wish to be part of the PEISAA basketball league and use PEIBOA officials that shot clock and properly working score clock is mandatory. We have given some schools new to the league a grace period but we way beyond that now. This can cause issues in the games for officials, especially come play-off time.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

The PEISAA High School Powerlifting season has concluded another year of remarkable achievement. Participation numbers remained strong, with 140 athletes from 13 high schools across the province competing in a total of five events over a three-month period. 4. General Comments

With Paul Goguen's retirement, many thought school gymnastics would also retire. Jon Bromley (West Royalty) and I got a hold of each other and both knew it had to continue! We were both a bit hesitant to take it all on so we agreed to be co-commissioners. Jon took the lead on Pre Novice and Novice and I took the lead on Bantam and Intermediate. We divided the hosting responsibilities and enlisted the technical expertise of nationally ranked judge, Janet Duval (Stonepark). The three of us began emailing and texting ideas for how to make it work and started to plan what this year's season would look like. We were able to secure some much needed sub time (half day each) and met for four hours at Birchwood in December to fully jump into the updates. This time was key and much appreciated so thanks to PEISAA for supporting our efforts. We kept in touch, almost daily by times, and scheduled a few more virtual meetings. Paul shared all his knowledge with us and we were thrilled he wanted to be a part of the championships as floor manager. No injuries were reported. We had excellent athletic therapy / first aid service. We sent around a feedback questionnaire (linked at bottom of report) - *Megan*

As Megan stated above, we both knew that we wanted gymnastics to continue at the school level. Filling Paul's shoes of course was a tall task, but I think we did that with ease through good planning and through our level of commitment to a well thought out event. Megan and I along with Janet Duval have plenty of experience running gymnastics meets over the last number of years. Megan, Janet and I made a great team and easily divided up key responsibilities. To me, the biggest sign that we ran a great event was that Paul Goguen himself was able to be involved and was happy with how everything went. The hand off has truly been completed. We have expressed to Paul that he can be involved as a floor manager for as long as he wishes to be in the years to come. Thanks to Mike Connolly and PEISAA for supporting our efforts. - *Jon*

5. New Format:

The new format was very well received - Bantam / Intermediate on Friday and Pre Novice and Novice being subdivided into 2 subdivisions. This narrows down the competition time and was far less taxing and stressful on coaches. We received an overwhelming amount of positive feedback on the new schedule.

6. Venue:

Stonepark's central location, ample parking and large seating capacity gym was an ideal venue. One issue was crowding between sessions but we re-arranged the seating and it helped. It is a big spectator event and even Stonepark does not have quite enough seating at times.

7. Changes to Technical Package:

The main two changes were combining the lists of skills into one master list and the alternate vault for Bantam / intermediate. Having only one list of skills (with the option to request skills to be added) was very well received by coaches and judges. The info was streamlined and on one page, easy to print and post the list as is. Consideration will be given to adopting the new vault at all age levels in Fall 2025. All PEISAA Gymnastics information is now stored in a shared google folder.

8. Scoring / Judging and Ties:

A new Google Sheets based scoring system was developed by head judge, Janet Duval (National High Performance judge). Zones 3 and 4 and the Provincial event used the system. It worked very well and offered instant, real time scoring.

PEISAA expressed concern over too many ties. Unfortunately, ties happen and are ultimately left with the judges and what the athletes do. In addition to Janet, we had many of PEI's top notch officials: Jim Rand, Alice and Jeff MacRae, and several others.

Prior to this year, to have a team score a school would have their top five all around scores added together to make a team score. Therefore, schools with less than five gymnasts competing would not be eligible for a team score. Teams with three or four gymnasts competing were given a team score even though their score would be naturally lower than a school with a team of five gymnasts. Team scores remain out of a possible total of 100.

9. Participation Numbers and No-Shows:

To our knowledge, there was possibly one or two gymnasts who simply did not show up. Several gymnasts had conflicts with the Sweetheart Hockey Tournament (female only) and a few were sick. All of these conflicts were communicated by coaches. When possible, the provincials should not take place the same weekend as this tournament or any gymnastics competitions. There will always be conflicts but some years work out better scheduling wise than others. Bantam and Intermediate went from 6 in 2023 to 23 In 2025. Zone 1 had only one athlete from Bloomfield and we will look to support their schools and have more participation next year. SIS attended with no coach.

10. Recommendations

Recommendations are mentioned throughout the report. Below are the main recommendations for next year:

1. Consider implementing the new vault format at all age levels for next year. Less mats are required for schools to do team practices.

2. Keep the new format with Bantam/Intermediate on Friday and Pre-Novice/Novice on Saturday with two subdivisions for each age group. 100% of responses from the post-event survey agreed with both of these changes. One scheduling consideration for Sat: those with a longer travel time could be in subdivision 2.
3. Adopt the new Google Sheets scoring system in Zone 1 and 2 so that all Zones and Provincials use the same system.
4. Consider/identify barriers to entry for more schools to compete in gymnastics. We aim to work with the PEIPEA and Department of Education to offer training to Phys-Ed teachers to develop gymnastics knowledge. Equipment and knowledge / training were two barriers identified in the post-event survey.

In addition, most (although not all) of our Canada Games athletes took part and elementary programs have grades 3 & 4 students doing wrestling at the school / zone / exhibition level so our overall participation numbers are much higher. Personally speaking, I had about 10-12 students attend practices regularly all season (including one wrestler who missed only 2 all season), but did not want to compete.

4. General Comments

Grouped weights and Default winners: With using groups weights and as mentioned above, we had 10 default winners total across all 8 age / gender classifications which was established *before* zones. It was told to me as commissioner 2 years ago the executive no longer supported giving medals to the default winners. I didn't exactly agree, but I didn't have a say and (reluctantly) agreed. I would like to revisit this. These wrestlers put in a full season and may have lots of training partners and exhibition matches, but due to the format for grouping weights Provincially, have no one for Provincials. ALL wrestlers are weighed in and weight groupings are created with the end result / Provincials in mind. A lot of care and thought goes into these groupings to ensure the final event, following Wrestling Canada Lutte's format for weight differential. Thanks to Tim Murphy for once again, doing an excellent job. In some cases, there

may be wrestlers in their zone they're close with, but when looking at the full picture, they have no one for provincials due to other groupings and maximum number of matches possible being created. Additionally, if someone scratches between zones and Provincials, the remaining athlete is now no longer eligible to compete *or* receive their medal, due to no fault of their own. In speaking with the coaches, it is our thought they have earned their medal through the season and if there happens to be no one on the day of provincials, whether it's by default or injury/sickness, we should not punish the athletes.

Safety and Injuries: we continue to be one of the safest (if not THE safest) PEISAA sports! In speaking with our athletic therapist, she had a few criers (due to losing the match / exhaustion) and didn't even need to give out a single bag of ice for minor bumps or bruises! It was her first time at a wrestling event and this is what she had to say:

"Very impressed! If people get trained how to get properly get taken down and be safe with their arms/neck positions it will likely always be a clean day for a medic. Especially with how many legitimate wrestlers there was! Always get to see no injuries and a smooth event!"

Equipment, coaching and officiating: With the support of Wrestling PEI and Wrestling Canada, we have top notch (World Championship) mats, developing new officials who are safe and knowledgeable and excellent coaching. WPEI offered on-mat officials training earlier this season and we did not have to bring in any off-Island officials to run the event. All of our Canada Games coaches were in attendance, coaching school-based teams.

Caliber of Competition: The level of competition was impressive and noticeably improved, from novice - senior.

Off-Island Competition: PEI high school wrestlers attended NBIAA and SSNS this season and had excellent results. There are more limited opportunities for middle school aged wrestlers in NB but that age group is included in SSNS events in the fall and winter.

Come Try Wrestling: In partnership with Wrestling Canada Lutte and Sport Canada, WPEI received a \$5000 grant to offer Come Try Wrestling and several schools benefitted.

Scheduling: there were no direct conflicts with this year's Provincials and Easter / March Break / Nationals / Rugby. If PN is added, the start time should be moved to 9am and bantam - senior moved to afternoon (pending #s).

5. Recommendations

- Continue to use grouped weights and best 2 of 3
- Continue to compete in SSNS and NBIAA
- Continue to support new & existing programs with equipment loan (mats, scales, clocks), coaching development, officials development and camps.
- It's a priority to establish 1-2 elementary programs in the Charlottetown area and western PEI. We've had interest from Francois Buote, Spring Park.
- Increase overall participation numbers & add new schools
- Add Pre Novice as an official category at Provincials. Was previously told it was a firm no, so this was not included as a suggestion in recent years, but all elementary schools who compete in wrestling already include 3s & 4s in their programs and they take part in zones as PN exhibition. Wrestling at that level already exists, but they've been excluded from attending Provincials for the past number of years. Prior to approx 2008, 3s and 4s were permitted to join the Novice category.
- Host duals / exhibition matches and/or camp earlier in the season between schools to allow for more matches.

Change the following....

If someone was registered for the zone but has no one, they still count towards their school's team total number of athletes to make their school eligible as a "team" (not their fault there is no opponent) but can not get team points & are not required to attend (if they have no opponent). They will be declared a default winner (no medal).

Suggested revision: If someone was registered for the zone but has no one, they still count towards their school's team total number of athletes to make their school eligible as a "team" (not their fault there is no opponent) but can not get team points & are not required to attend (if they have no opponent). They will be declared a default winner and receive a medal.

If a wrestler has a scheduled opponent(s) for the Provincials and the other opponent(s) withdraw due to injury / sickness / conflict between Zone qualifier and Provincials, the remaining wrestler is declared the winner, receives a medal and team points.

Closing remarks

In re-reading last year's report, I had forgotten that we did a large group picture at Provincials to wish Hannah Taylor well at the 2024 Paris Olympics, as she was newly qualified to the Games. She got her start in Wrestling with the PEISAA, as did Alysha Corrigan with Rugby. And just a few years later, they both end up at the same Games in medal matches.

The value of school sport and the opportunity it provides kids sometimes gets lost in the chaos of the day-to-day work of running things. Re-reading my report from last year was a nice reflection on the year - I was attendance in Paris for Hannah's first match and Alysha's silver medal and neither would have been there if it had not been for opportunities we created through the PEISAA.

I am on deferred leave in February 2026 and would like to wish next year's host well! I am happy to stay on as commissioner for the first half of the year. Big thank you to the coaches & athletes for their hard work & dedication this season as well as for the help with venue set up / tear down for Provincials. Thanks to PEISAA for supporting wrestling!

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

The PEISAA provincial badminton championships were held April 22 to April 26, 2025. This year, 5 Charlottetown and area schools were used, along with Bluefield for Mixed Doubles.

Championship titles in Novice, Bantam, Intermediate, Juvenile and Senior boys and girls categories were all up for grabs in singles, doubles and mixed play. Most of our Island schools were represented in zone playoffs, with the top two from the four zones advancing to the provincials in Novice, Bantam and Intermediate. In Juvenile, Senior and Mixed categories, there were East and West regional events to decide who went to Provincials.

In the Senior Men's final, Henry Dong of Rural defeated his teammate Vincent Chang 21-10, 21-6 to win the provincial title. Noah MacIsaac from Francois Buote defeated Faisal Ahamadi of Rural 21-10 and 21-10 to claim the senior boys bronze medal. In doubles action, Charlottetown Rural claimed the 3 top positions. Henry Dong teamed up with Vincent Dong and defeated Will Dunn and Nick Sullivan of Rural 21-15 and 21-13 to win the gold. The bronze medal was won by Rural as well. Kayden Kelly and Keaton Bradley from Rural defeated Jared Kenny and Reece Gallant from Westisle 21-14 and 21-19 in an entertaining match. With first, second and fourth in singles and a first, second and third in doubles, Charlottetown Rural easily won the Provincial Men's Championship with 19 points.

In other action, Colonel Gray had the two top senior women's singles players. Sushmita Kolloju defeated Lily MacVicar 21-12 and 21-18 to win the Senior Women's Provincial Singles Championship. Rebekah McGeoghegan of Rural defeated her teammate Leoni Lam to claim the bronze medal. In doubles, Sushmita Kolloju of Gray teamed up with Tia Pham to defeat Rachel MacFadyen and Mava Gauthier of Bluefield 21-5 and 21-6. In an all Westisle bronze medal match, Dani Noye and Naomi Cormier defeated Reid Hart and Kate Hutchinson 21-8 and 21-7 to claim the bronze medal. By coming first and second in singles, along with a first in doubles, Colonel Gray won the Provincial Women's Championship with 13 points.

Senior Mixed Doubles champions this year are Tia Pham and David Dinh of Gray. They defeated Rebekah McGeoghegan and Kayden Kelly of Rural 21-18 and 21-16 to win the title. Lily MacVicar and Vineet Nagapuri of Gray defeated Rachel MacFadyen and Isaac Fraser of Bluefield

21-12 and 21-16 to win the bronze medal. Colonel Gray wins the senior mixed provincial title with 7 points.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVING SPORT

This year was the seventh year for regional qualifiers in the juvenile and senior divisions. The schedule was very similar to past years. We had a very large group of senior men's singles in the east this year and a very low number of juvenile boy's doubles in the west this year. If this continues to happen, we may have to adjust some qualifiers due to the numbers.

Also, with the numbers of players per school changing over time, the split of the east/west may have to be looked at. It is possible that Grace Christian, Immanuel Christian and The Mount Academy may have to move to the west to even up numbers. It will be something to monitor and maybe implement next season.

This year we used google sheets to do our regional qualifiers and double elimination draws. I set them up and shared them with the athletic directors from the schools involved. In most cases, the scores were put right on the google draw and this way the other ADs could follow along and I could get instant results. The AD running the event should send out results following the event. Sometimes, this does not happen and I have to figure things out.

This was the third year of our new provincial tiebreaker in badminton. In the past, we have had times where up to 4 schools have tied for a provincial championship. We used it in one category this year where we had a tie for a team championship. It was quick to use and is a better solution than having multiple championship schools.

Just like the past few years, this badminton season was unique. Basketball season ended later this year which left us with less time for tryouts and the provincials were still the last weekend of April. Thankfully this year we did not have a conflict with the annual band trips to Halifax. We were able to go back to our usual schedule of Mixed on Tuesday, and the other divisions on Thursday and Saturday. This is the best model and hopefully we can use it most years.

Having players report scores at Provincials after every game worked very well in the draws that I ran this year. I recommend that it is used at zone play as well. It is great to see that the players are aware of how important scores are. There is also a group of P.E. teachers who have become very efficient at doing PEISAA tie breakers. This is very important in regional and zone play, as well as in pool play at provincials.

All 4 zones now align for bantam and intermediate zone play in badminton. Each zone has qualifiers and then goes to a double elimination tournament to decide who goes onto provincials.

The elementaries in zone 3 are still using a single elimination tournament that I will try and move to a double elimination tournament next year.

There is still a lot of confusion with rules in novice and there appears to be some parents who are either coaching their children while on the court or cheering inappropriately at times. I did address it at provincials on Saturday but on the Thursday night it was a bit of a problem. This is something we will have to address moving forward.

With the novice level having some difficulties, it may be time to implement that senior high or junior high leadership students help at qualifiers and at the double elimination tournament. Helping to keep score and remember lines can be difficult for some younger players. Also, the conduct of some parents will have to be addressed with a note to be read before all zone competitions next year. They cannot be coaching from the sidelines and need to know only to clap and get excited when a great rally happens. They should not be clapping when a player misses a shot, and their child gets the easy point. This is not great sportsmanship.

This year we were in the Charlottetown area and next year we will be back to the Summerside area. Bluefield has become the host of the mixed championships and having a school in the middle of the province hosting this championship in one evening is working very well. I think that moving back and forth between the two largest areas in the province for all singles and doubles events is the way to run the championship. It also aligns with many of our other sports championship formats.

Next year we are going to make it very clear that badminton needs to be a priority for players and for schools. If a player goes to a zone championship and qualifies for provincials, they are expected to play. If they do not, the school will be fined \$100 for them not showing up or saying they cannot attend. Only extenuating circumstances will be approved, and the player and school will not be fined. There are still players going to zones and qualifying, only to say they cannot go. This needs to stop.

Lastly, this was the 8th year for Yonex as a sponsor. Thanks to Yonex for being our badminton sponsor and for the great prizes they give us.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

This year was a mixed bag for high school rugby on PEI. Players, coaches, referees, and Athletic Directors all put in countless hours to continue the tradition of high-caliber high school rugby across the Island. Over the past few seasons, there has been a troubling trend of decreasing men's participation in the sport. Hopefully some work can be done to grow these numbers in the coming years.

Congratulations to Mike Connolly on completing his first year as School Sport Coordinator — and thank you for the behind-the-scenes work to help make the season a success. Thank you also to Anthony Scott for his role as Referee Assignor, and to Walter MacEwen for maintaining the PEISAA website. And of course, thank you to everyone else whose efforts contributed to another great season.

As in previous years, high school rugby coaches were required to complete NCCP's Safe Sport and Making Head Way modules, as well as World Rugby's Rugby Ready. These courses remain a strong foundation for coaching development and education.

Pre-season scrimmages were once again held for all A and AA teams. These sessions have become a valuable part of the lead-up to the season, giving players meaningful reps while allowing coaches to guide from the field. I'd argue they're just as effective as pre-season tournaments in preparing teams for the year.

On the field, both the women's and men's A leagues delivered a high level of competition. The women's A league split into two tiers. Montague and both Charlottetown Rural teams finished in a three-way tie for first. Colonel Gray, Bluefield, and Westisle were close behind in a tight race for fourth through sixth. In the final, Charlottetown Rural #1 defeated Montague 19–5 to claim the championship.

In the men's A league, it was a tight competition all season. Montague and Bluefield finished 1–2 in the regular season but were both upset in the semifinals. Three Oaks edged Westisle 17–12 in a thrilling final that came down to the last play.

The AA women's league saw four teams compete in 10s rugby. Montague went undefeated in the regular season but was narrowly upset 5–0 in the final by Westisle. Unfortunately, no AA men's teams were fielded this year.

In the AAA women's league, Charlottetown Rural was dominant from start to finish, going undefeated and defeating Colonel Gray 33–19 in the final. On the men's side, Bluefield once again went undefeated in the regular season for the third straight year, but Three Oaks rose to the occasion in the championship game with a 26–21 win in another exciting final.

Thank you to everyone for your continued work in giving Island high school students the opportunity to play this great game.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVING SPORT - 2024 Check-in

- The PEISAA needs more rugby officials. The recruitment, training, and retention of officials continues to fall solely on the shoulders of the PEIRU. The PEISAA has yet to offer any assistance. This **NEEDS** to happen. The PEIRU has enough officials to cover PEIRU activities. There are not enough officials to cover the PEISAA high school season.
 - **Not completed. No new officials were trained this year leaving only 7 trained officials to cover all high school games.**

- Additionally, PEISAA high school rugby officials are being paid significantly less than high school rugby officials in the other maritime provinces.
 - **Unknown.**
- An alternative for the Safe Rugby session should be explored. It has become apparent with many teams taking part in pre-season tournaments that the current Safe Rugby sessions are irrelevant. The current session takes place in late-April, when several teams have already played full games and all teams have been training for weeks. Also, the current set-up is 100% reliant on me, and if I am too busy, I won't be able to plan and hold in-person sessions like this year.
 - **Not completed. For the second year in a row, Safe Rugby sessions were not held because I did not have the time.**
- Continue to remove PEI-specific items from the Rugby Guidelines.
 - **Not completed. My pre-season review did not result in any changes for this year.**
- Guidelines for consistency in league all star selections should be created. This year, we used the number of all stars from last season as guidelines, however, once again there was not a nomination or voting process. University and representative coaches use all star selections as identifiers for recruitment and selection, so a more official process is warranted. Suggested format:
 - 7s rugby: average of 3 all stars per team (i.e 4 teams: 12 all stars)
 - 10s rugby: average of 3 all stars per team (i.e 3 teams: 9 all stars)
 - 15s rugby: average of 4 all stars per team (i.e 4 teams: 16 all stars)
 - **Unknown. I have not received any information about rugby all stars for this year.**
- The schedule for pre-season scrimmages should be set well in advance to ensure that officials can complete the on-field portion of their certification.
 - **Not completed.**
- The AA league was a massive success this year. It **MUST** continue. Whether as 7s or 10s. Westisle, Montague, and Kensington fielded both men's and women's teams for the first time in many years. Several players from these programs are now representing PEI on the provincial teams, so it's very important that these schools continue offering rugby. It would be great to work towards having programs at Souris, Francois-Buote and potentially the Mount Academy.
 - **Partially completed.**
- The AAA reserves games were an interesting addition. These should continue, with a focus being on having AAA reserves and top A players taking part.
 - **Not completed.**

6. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVING SPORT

- After a conversation with Mike, I'd like to request that the PEISAA apply for funding to be used in partnership with the PEIRU to help rugby in two areas:
 - Officials Development - this funding would allow for multiple officials courses to be held throughout the year. One option would be to hold a course in the late-fall/early-winter and then work with provincial team coaches to schedule some on-field work with those teams prior to the start of the high school season.

- Tackle Smart program - this funding would allow for a PEI coach to receive training to deliver Tackle Smart sessions. These sessions are designed to teach coaches how to safely introduce the tackle and other contact skills. Once we have a trained educator, we could hold 2-3 of these sessions throughout the winter and spring to ensure that each team has at least one coach who is trained to introduce the tackle and other contact skills. This would replace the Safe Rugby session.
- Continue to remove PEI-specific items from the Rugby Guidelines.
- Guidelines for consistency in league all star selections should be created. This year, we used the number of all stars from last season as guidelines, however, once again there was not a nomination or voting process. University and representative coaches use all star selections as identifiers for recruitment and selection, so a more official process is warranted. Suggested format:
 - 7s rugby: average of 3 all stars per team (i.e 4 teams: 12 all stars)
 - 10s rugby: average of 3 all stars per team (i.e 3 teams: 9 all stars)
 - 15s rugby: average of 4 all stars per team (i.e 4 teams: 16 all stars)
- The schedule for pre-season scrimmages should be set well in advance to ensure that officials can complete the on-field portion of their certification.
- The pre-season scrimmage and league schedules should be set as far in advance as possible. This would require schools to try to determine what teams they will have further in advance. If we could release the schedule by mid-April, it would be helpful for organizing transportation and officials. Also with young people having more commitments (work, sports, etc.), the further in advance they have the schedule, the easier it is to work around.
- Work should be done to grow the AA league. The level this year in the women's league was higher than last but the men's league didn't happen. With fewer men playing high school rugby, this league should help smaller schools continue to have programs. It would also be great to work towards having programs at Souris, Francois-Buote and potentially the Mount Academy.

33 Registered triathletes and only 4 did not finish or did not attend.

PROVINCIAL EXCELLENCE BANNERS:

Summerside Intermediate School received the Bantam/Intermediate banner.

Colonel Gray High School received the Male Senior High banner and Female High banner.

GENERAL COMMENTS:

The newly formed PEISAA triathlon (since 2011-2018) was held on May 19, 2025. Start time was scheduled for 8:30 AM but was delayed a bit. Finish time with cleaning up was completed before noon. Students and staff from seven schools swam, biked and ran the course from the Credit Union Place (CUP) in Summerside. The course continued down St. Lawrence St. to the Summerside boardwalk (bike), and along Notre Dame St., and Northumberland St.(run) The weather was cool at 11C with little wind but a threat of rain. The rain did not transpire but the wood on the boardwalk was wet. The winds were down which was a nice gift for the participants. The course was a 200 M (two swimmers/lane) swim, 10.8 - 14 KM bike, and 1.5 KM - 2.7 KM run. The distances of the event depending on the age level of the participants. Due to the potential weather conditions the routes for the bike and run were reduced to the lower distances. I did not hear of any complaints.

The event this year was a collaborative effort with TriPEI and the PEISAA. A total of 29 triathletes from bantam through to senior and teachers/school staff were registered for the event. TriPEI wanted to cap the event at 30 so this worked out very nicely. Andree Morrison, head official, as well as Mike Connolly and Cheryl Tanton, who are also qualified officials, were aided by

lifeguards, student volunteers and adult volunteers on the road. As safety is of utmost concern, trained first aid personnel were present, with key individuals always in radio communication. They were needed at the finish line as we had participants who fell while biking and had some cuts and 'road rash'. A detailed course information was given via email to participating schools as well as the mandatory athlete's pre-event meeting at pool side. The Summerside Police were informed of the event.

The PEISAA provided email communication to schools, Provincial Championship banners as well as triathlon merchandise to schools/participants to purchase. Participants' total times were maintained so that Provincial banners could be awarded. These times were manually taken, starting with the wave starts. The adopted model of each school/participant registering on CNN and prepaying prior to the triathlon made registration on the morning of the event run smoothly.

The facilities at Credit Union Place and the surrounding community of Summerside worked perfectly for this event as well as the partnership with TriPEI trailer and their equipment. This event will continue to need the support of TriPEI due to equipment needs and valuable human resources (volunteers).

Triathlon is a 'new' sport for many. Coaches did a great job educating their athletes on transition, and endurance. Family and friends were very excited about this event and it is hoped that it will continue for next year. Thank you to the PEISAA for tabulating the scores, day of and planning support, medals and banners, food and welcoming school triathlon back on the PEISAA calendar. Special thanks to Andree and Jennifer who did all the heavy planning and volunteer recruitment for the event. I also want to thank the School Milk Foundation for providing the finish line milk and All Star Cresting for triathlon merchandise.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. This is an open course design of the bike/run course, adults (with an understanding of triathlons) continue to volunteer for this event.
2. There must be a knowledgeable bike person checking all bikes for safety (tires and brakes). This does not need to be a business or a certified mechanic. They also should have tape or something to mark off the bikes that have been checked.
3. Gradually increase the number of participants.
4. Continue to have team banners. A team must have FOUR participants for Female and Male.
5. PEISAA should communicate the information earlier to schools for their planning.
6. Due to the wet wood on the boardwalk there were injuries and unsafe conditions. This boardwalk is also open to the public. Due to both of these reasons it is not a viable route for the bike portion, even though it could be safer than a road route. This should be reviewed for next year.
7. Swim set up was fine but I would recommend that the swim timer also use a flutter board to single when the swimmers are on their last lap.

PEI Schools Triathlon

Monday May 20, 2025.

Planning Stages: March 2025 – May 20, 2025

Planning for the school's triathlon began in February/March of 2025. Mike Connolly (PEI School Athletic Association Sport Coordination) reached out to Triathlon PEI to see if they could organize the event. Jennifer Power-Hawrylak: Provincial Coach for Triathlon PEI and Andrea Morrison: Vice President for Triathlon PEI agreed to undertake this event.

Dates were proposed, and Jennifer established the best one for pool and venue availability was Monday May 19, 2025. As this was a holiday, we had to wait for verification from PEI schools so that we could hold an event on this date.

Once approved, Jennifer and Andrea began organizing the event.

Jennifer confirmed:

- 1) use of the pool, changing rooms, lobby with Credit Union place
- 2) Lifeguards
- 3) Permissions from City police for roads, boardwalk/pathways
- 4) Racetrack area for use for transition.
- 5) Volunteers

Andrea worked on CCN set up, registrations, logistics, sanctioning form, equipment, start order, bib numbers, first aid, communications between Schools, TRiPEI and others.

The bike and run route was walked, driven, and reviewed multiple times to determine length, turnaround areas, and volunteer placement for course controllers. All distances for swim, bike and run were confirmed and set in accordance with Triathlon Canada guidelines.

Mike Connolly confirmed age groups: Individual and Relay: Bantam (grade 7-8) Intermediate (Grade 9) Senior (grade 10 – 12) A division for teachers was also included.

Registration was set up on CCN – there was no charge for the athletes. They registered and paid a fee to their schools.

Jennifer and Andrea met in April to start a list of volunteers and tasks that needed to be dealt with for set up, tear down and double checking the bike/run routes. We also planned out the exit from the Credit Union place to the transition area. Transition area entry/exit was determined later.

Swim:

Swimmers were organized into waves. 2 swimmers per lane. A swim cut off time was set for each category. A volunteer was assigned to each lane to count laps. No floatation devices were permitted. Goggles and swim caps were optional.

Swim order and distances:

- 1) Bantam: 200 meters
- 2) Intermediate: 250 meters
- 3) Senior and Teacher: 300 meters

The transition area was set up with racks labeled according to each division. Each spot of the rack was labeled with competitor's bib number. Entry/exit was marked with chalk arrows.

The bike route was measured, and distances set:

Bantam: 10.8 km

Intermediate: 10.8 km

Senior/Teacher: 14 km

As the bike route would take the riders on several laps, a suitable turnaround spot had to be determined and evaluated.

The run route was set on the sidewalk of the surrounding neighborhood. Again – distances were set. Measured and turnaround spots determined. Run was an out and back for each division.

Bantam: 1.5 km

Intermediate: 2.7 km

Senior/Teacher: 2.7 km

Both the bike and run routes were evaluated several times by Jennifer, Andrea and volunteers. Areas of concern were noted.

Registration was to be in the main lobby of the pool. Names would be confirmed, bibs handed out, body marking done. Participants then brought their bikes and helmets to transition for checking and racking. All athletes and coaches were to be on deck by 8:15 for a race briefing. A pre-race guide was written and sent out to coaches before the race.

Approximately two weeks prior to the event, an official School commissioner was appointed, Cheryl Tanton. We were unable to schedule an in-person meeting, so communication about various aspects of the event had to be by email.

The week before, all volunteers were preassigned their positions for the event. We used newly certified Level one officials from Triathlon PEI, the Summerside masters swim team (pool controllers), and known volunteers from within the Triathlon community. Jennifer organized each volunteer into a phone contact group (swim, bike, run, first aid and overall) to allow quick communication for the duration of the event. Mike oversaw timing, start/finish area. He also looked after food and water for after the event. Cheryl offered to assist where needed.

A small team of volunteers went to the venue the day before the event to deliver the equipment trailer and do a final walk through all the areas. Transition area, with bike enter/exit, run enter/exit, mount/dismount and finish areas chosen. Equipment was sorted and ready for the morning. Swim start lists were prepared, course control papers printed for the bike and run volunteers. Labels made ready for bike racks. All coaches were emailed with final race info – which included an alternate plan in case of poor weather.

The course set up began at about 5:00 am (Jennifer and her husband Brian) placed all bike and run markers. Hazards were marked. Directional arrows were chalked onto sidewalks/roads were needed. The second group of volunteers set up arrived by 5:30 to do transition area. The goal was to have all set up completed by 7:00 am. There was a slight delay in getting the registration tables.

As volunteers arrived, they were given their clipboards, safety vests, stop signs (if needed) and the time to be in position. The course allowed some to use cars/Ebikes to travel to their destination. The first aid team (Canadian Ski Patrol) used an ebike to patrol the bike route, as this was determined to be the most likely place for potential injury.

Race Day

Race course and transition set up was completed by 7 am. The registration desk was the last to be put in place. Two volunteers checked in the athletes, issued the bib numbers, body marked and directed them to transition and back to the locker room with their gear. Bike racks were arranged according to divisions.

Several athletes requested to register on race day – we did accommodate only because others had dropped out and there was room left in the swim waves.

A bike mechanic was on hand to check bikes along with volunteers at transition. Every athlete was preassigned a spot to rack their bikes. The spots were labeled with their bib numbers.

Race briefing was held on the pool deck at about 8:15 by Andrea and Mike. Due to the wet, cool weather, a decision had been made to shorten the bike course. All coaches received this information the night before. Questions were answered and safety was emphasized. Jennifer explained the bike route and turnaround spots.

Phone communication confirmed volunteers were in place.

Wave one was called to the start. Waves 2 and 3 followed at pre-arranged intervals. Pool volunteers-maintained communication with Transition and bike route personal so everyone knew who was on course

Pool swims went smoothly.

Athletes entered transition well and took bikes to the mount/dismount line. Along the bike route, athletes were cautioned to slow down on turns. Several experienced falls, but none wanted to withdraw or wanted first aid.

Athletes re- entered the transition area, racked their bikes in their assigned spots and proceeded onto the run course. No issues reported with knowing where to go etc. Finish line was controlled by Mike who recorded finish times and retrieved the number bibs.

Communication between volunteers was excellent. All athletes were easily tracked and accounted for throughout the race.

Final times and placings took a bit of time to work out due to being hand timed/calculated.

Awards were given to top three in each category.

Tear down and clean up was ongoing as each segment of the race concluded.

Overall – very positive feedback from athletes, parents and all those involved.

Recommendations:

1. The Victoria Day date works very well as the pool is available, and traffic is light

1. A general meeting between representatives from Triathlon PEI and the PEI School Athletic Federation should take place at least 12 weeks prior to the event. This is essential to establish who will take charge/responsibility for various aspects of organizing the event.

1. The School Commissioner should be appointed at least 6-8 weeks prior to the event so they can have a greater role in the planning process.
1. Regular communication with the schools to encourage early registration.
1. Pre-Race meeting several days before the event with the school Coaches/representatives. This will allow organizers to pass along vital registration/race procedures to the coaches, who should then pass the information along to their athletes. This can be via Zoom.
1. School Representatives/coaches are encouraged to be present with athletes during the registration process at the event.
1. Event registration through CCN will close 3 days prior to the event date. There will be NO last minute or race day registration. This must be firmly communicated to schools.
1. School Representatives/coaches should provide a non-work email that can be used for contact during non-workdays. This will allow for last-minute updates/changes to be communicated to all involved.
1. Registration fees should go directly to Triathlon PEI. This year, fees were paid to PEI schools.
1. School commissioner should not be in a dual role as a coach. They need to be available to the organizers for assistance/technical advice throughout the event.
1. Spectators/parents need to be reminded to remain off the race routes. Perhaps designate viewing areas.
1. First aiders need to be on ebike – one should be assigned to transition/finish area.
1. Pool organization and set up: no changes.
1. Bike route: Look at an alternate route – the 2025 route was manageable but with increased numbers, it will be too crowded.
1. Run route: No change
1. Categories: Keep Bantam, Intermediate, Senior Individual. Eliminate relay and teacher category.
1. Timing clock in addition to cell phones.

1. Pullover bibs (borrowed from Nordic Sports PEI) were excellent and allowed easy identification of all athletes.

This may have been the best year in memory for weather for flag football as we never had to cancel any games due to rain. The A1 and 2/AA provincials were all held on Tuesday June 10 in Summerside. The senior high was also held on the CUP turf as well on June 4. This continues to be a great location for the provincials. The level of flag football at provincials was outstanding this year. All 10 leagues had 4 outstanding teams at provincials.

The East schedule this year was split between the Cornwall turf and François Buote. Thanks to the Town of Cornwall (Kim Meunier) and François Buote (JP Gallant and Mitchell Cassey) for their cooperation with field usage this year. The senior high league was divided between the CUP turf and Bluefield. Thanks to the City of Summerside and Darryl Boudreau for their cooperation.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVING SPORT

This year we had quite a few new officials join. This helps the sport to grow and improve. We need to continue to recruit new officials so we can have two officials for each game and three in playoff games. This year we had 2 officials on over 95% of the junior high games. There were always two officials on senior high games. Whenever possible, we should attempt to have as many games being played on a turf field. However, referee availability needs to be there to accomplish this. The 3:40 start time is tough to get 4-6 officials to the turf.

Mouth guards and shorts without pockets were still mandatory this year. Numbers need to be put on the front and back of all jerseys next year. Poppers were also used for the second year with great success. The game continues to evolve and improve every year.

3. GENERAL COMMENTS

- 2) With only have two AA teams in each of the boys and girls divisions, we had to have them mix in with the “A” league for the regular season. This seemed to work out fine again this year and once playoffs began the “AA” teams then competed against one another. With other summer sports on the go at the same time I think it would be difficult to have the AA teams travel East to compete in one league.

D) Playoffs

- 1) For provincials, thank you for the use of the Credit Union Place turf field for hosting the provincial championships this year. The medal games were close with many coming down to the last few minutes to determine the winners. I would suggest staggering the Intermediate games like we did at the High school level to allow for more time for medal presentations and to possible do these on the grass to allow for the next set of games to begin on time.

E) Officials

It was great to see new officials this year and this allowed for more games to have two officials at the Intermediate and High School level and to have three officials in all the Provincial games.

PEI School Athletic Association (PEISAA) Report

The PEISAA is the body responsible for the administration of school sport in PEI according to the rules and expectations of the Department and the provincial school boards, under the auspices of the Education Act. Recent projects include:

- o 2024-25 – The PEISAA contracted Higher Design to produce 5 videos promoting school sport. We have released 2 of the videos in 2023-24, Thank You Official and Thank You Coach. Videos Dear Mom and Dad, Dear Student, and Success Stories were released this year.
- o September 2024-25 – As per PEISAA Policy, ALL coaches that participate in PEISAA must take “Safe Sport” in addition to “Making Headway”, an online concussion course offered by the NCCP; We have over 1,000 coaches that have completed the “Safe Sport” training. This program has been continued.
- o January 2025 PEISAA full Policy Manual reviewed, and recommendations made to the executive for adoption of new and updated policies. The number of these recommendations was high, so we have been slowly adopting a few each meeting.
- o March 2025 - PEISAA added a new commissioner coaches’ position to deal with all things related to coaching and coaching certification and will be responsible for the enforcement and fines related to coach certification.
- o September 2025 – The PEISAA approved funding to continue to pay for coaches interested in taking “Redefining Winning”, a course developed by School Sport Canada, specific to coaching school sport.
- o November 2025 – The PEISAA is a member of CIAAA (Canadian Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association), allowing all our AD’s to utilize the resources from this association. The PEISAA provided funding to school athletic administrators to attend the CIAAA PD workshops in Calgary, Alberta. We also partnered with the PEI Phys-ed Association in recommending courses for the CIAAA to deliver to our High School and Intermediate AD’s at the PEITF Convention in 2025.
- o June 2025 – PEISAA will be holding our very second annual awards dinner “Celebration of School Sport”. The evening will see the presentation of all our major awards which include Coach of the Year, Executive of the Year, Administrator’s Award, Officials Award and Merit Award. Also, all the students nominated for the Brodie McCarthy “Student Athlete of the Year” will be invited. Each high school has opportunity to nominate one student. The award will then be presented that evening with all nominees also receiving recognition.
- o September 2024 – We discontinued league all-star awards as we felt that this was a duplication of individual school awards. Each individual school will award 2 award per sport at their own award banquet.

- o November 2024 PEISAA Awarded the PEI Special Olympics Presidents Award for our work on the sport of Unified Bocce as an all-inclusive sport.
- o Made unified bocce an official sport with banner and bar in the PEISAA calendar for 2024 after a 2-year pilot project with Special Olympics PEI. We reached capacity with our Special Olympic athletes for track and field and have expanded their offering for 2025.
- o February 2025 – New technical document was created for gymnastics to bring it more in line with current practices. We ran a new vault pilot which was well received and should cut down on ties. This will be implemented next year.
- o Increased the PEISAA PEI Mutual student scholarship to \$1000 from \$500.
- o PEISAA Outstanding Student-Athlete Awards are awarded annually and are separate from athletic awards. Based on academic performance and participation in school sport. The philosophy that drives school sport is based on the ability of a student to combine athletic ability and academics as he or she strives to be the best they can be. It has been, and continues to be, an emphasis of the PEI School Athletic Association that schools will expect their student athletes to maintain an academic standing relative to the student's ability. The emphasis of school sport toward the student athlete and away from the athlete, thus further separating school athletics from amateur sport and providing the academic focus that the PEI School Athletic Association must have in place to fulfill its mandate.
 - Grade 12 student and in full time attendance
 - Six (6) Grade-12 Credits
 - 85% academic standing after the 2nd semester midterm report for the certificate
 - Certificate for all who qualify
 - PEISAA Medal for the top female and male of each school to be awarded at graduation ceremony or school awards banquet.

School sport highlights:

- o PEISAA is the only provincial school sport organization that offers competition to all levels of students in the province across six (6) age classifications covering grade 3-12.
- o Provide extracurricular interscholastic competition for 66 Member Schools.
- o Offer 102 Provincial Championships, 10,000+ student athletes, 18 team and individual sports
- o Brought back Triathlon into PEISAA School Sport and made it an official school championship with banner and bar for 2025.
- o Support provided by over 1,000 volunteer coaches, convened by 24 sport commissioners, and a volunteer Executive
- o Approved a grade 9 power lifting pilot of 2026.

- o Did a comprehensive review of the 2024-25 basketball season and made recommendations for officials development, league structure, schedule format, and length of season. Will be starting earlier and shortening season. Moving to 3 divisions in intermediate AA, A tier 1, and A tier 2 with weekend jamborees as league games to cut down on travel and travel related expenses.
- o Brought PEI Police Association on as a major sponsor for Rugby for a 5-year period. We feel this is a good fit with PEIPA being able to offer direction for students interested in law enforcement.
- o East Link TV televised some of our team sport championships on their platform. We hope to expand that in 2026.
- o Partner with PEI School Milk Foundation to deliver chocolate milk to all of our provincial championships.
- o Sr Men's baseball will be a major sport for 2025-26 season. Int boys' baseball will require more discussion in the fall to determine if it stays as a minor sport. Looking to move to more of a tournament format for Int boys' baseball.
- o Will be introducing championship banners at the bantam age group for 2026.
- o Expanded the Flag Football league into multiple tiers. Expanded to A in Sr and A tier 1 and tier 2 in intermediate. This was due to the expanding interest in flag football and was well received by the schools and leagues.
- o Have private school agreements with the Mount, Immanuel Christian and Grace Christian schools so they can compete in single and dual PEISAA sports.
